Montreal, March 4.—C. P. R. earnings for January, 1902, were \$2,621,732; working expenses, \$1,609,331; net profits, \$820,401. In January, 1901, net profits were \$648,195, and for seven months ended Jan. 31, 1901, net profits, \$2,219,243; working expenses, \$1,468,042; net profits, \$951,201. For seven months, ended Jan. 31, 1901, there was a net profit of \$2,274,834. The increase in net profits over the same period last year is, therefore, for January, \$172,264, and from July 1 to Jan. 1 there was an increase of \$1,823,406.

## THE NO-PROFIT ARRANGEMENT.

Bringing Liquor Traffic Under Public Ownership.

Finds Favor at a Conference of Clergymen and Citizens Who Favor Temperance.

Toronto, March 4.—In the discussion which followed Earl Grey's address delivered here on Saturday, explaining the "no profit" liquor movement in England, Mr. R. D. Noble strongly endorsed Earl Grey's scheme and recommended its adoption by the people of Canada, as it had been demonstrated in the past that prohibition has not succeeded in any part of the world. The earl pointed out that the trust companies' movement was simple, and he thought that if it was launched in Canada it would bring about just as good results as in England.

### THE PLAN OF OPERATION.

At present the trust movement is operating in thirteen counties in England, and the nominal capital of these trust companies is placed at \$555,000. In brief, the main object of Earl Grey's scheme is to secure the issuing of licenses for selling liquor to those who will have no financial object in pushing the sale of the same. The plan is to form a simple plan, with responsible men as directors to apply for any new licenses. These licenses will be issued on licensed premises were managed by capable men, who were given a commission on the sale of all refreshments other than intoxicating drinks. At the end of each year the profits are given to public improvement, except that 5 per cent goes to the directors of the company, as interest on the capital. In conclusion Earl Grey said that when he entered Canada he was glad to know that Canadians were actively engaged in temperance reform. He thought his scheme was superior to the principles of prohibition.

### RESOLUTION ADOPTED.

The following resolution, moved by Rev. C. L. Ingles, and seconded by Mr. G. Weston Wrigley, was passed: "Resolved, That the opinion of the meeting is that the purpose of the formation of a league to secure the elimination of private interests in and profit from the liquor traffic, and to bring the whole trade under public ownership."

After the conference ended a meeting was called, and Canon Welch was voted to the chair. Some of those present thought a committee should be appointed to prepare a report on the resolution. It was finally decided to hold a special meeting, when it was expected further action would be taken. Bishop Sweetman occupied the chair, and among those present were: Premier Ross, Dr. Parkin, C.M.G., Rev. Bro. Charles J. Pitt Lewis, Canon Welch, Mayor Howland, Robert D'Oyly Noble, Rev. Mr. Davenport, G. B. Kirkpatrick, Rev. Oswald Rigby.

### THE NEW HAMBURG FIRE.

New Hamburg, Ont., March 4.—The fire that on Sunday destroyed the buildings of the New Hamburg Manufacturing Company was the most disastrous that ever occurred here. The strong southeast wind blowing at the time carried great clinders in large quantities from independent, Commercial, American and other buildings in the immediate vicinity, but fortunately a steady shower of rain came, keeping the roofs and walls from catching fire. The fire got into the building under control. The buildings belonged to Henry Brodbeck and were leased to a joint stock company. They were valued at \$12,000; insured in the Gore Mutual for \$3,000, and Economical for \$2,000. The loss on stock was \$500. In building steam threshing outfits, traction engines, land rollers, etc. The stock was insured for \$7,000 in the following companies: London Mutual, \$2,000; Merchants of Toronto, \$2,000; Economical, \$1,000. It is likely that the company will rebuild immediately.

## THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Adopts an Address to Prince Henry of Prussia.

Prohibition Bill Comes Up for Its Second Reading on Wednesday.

Toronto, March 3.—Almost immediately after the legislature assembled yesterday afternoon, Premier Ross rose and moved that an address be presented by the legislature to Prince Henry of Prussia on his arrival at Niagara Falls, on Wednesday next, and that Hon. Mr. Harcourt and Messrs. Brethaupt, Bowman, Kribs, Cross, Matheson and Carscallen be a delegation to present it.

Speaking to the motion, the premier said that they were glad to welcome his royal highness among other things for his relationship to the English royal family, which had planted its members on some of the most illustrious thrones of Europe. But besides this they were glad to welcome him because so many of his race were citizens of this province. The premier spoke in the highest terms of their fine qualities, and declared that by their industry and frugality they had been an example to the rest of the population. He spoke moreover of the debt which the world owes to Germany for her advances in science, and particularly of the benefit which Ontario had derived from the German educational system, which had served to some extent as a model for our own.

Mr. Whitney seconded the motion, and in doing so acquiesced in everything which Mr. Ross had said regarding the excellent qualities of the German race. It was only right, he declared, that when the opportunity offered they should show their appreciation of that fine people, who formed no inconsiderable part of our own population.

Mr. Briethaupt regretted that the prince's visit was so short, otherwise he would have invited him to Berlin and there have shown him what a German colony had achieved in a new world.

Mr. Cross suggested that the whole house partake in the welcome, but the premier thought a small delegation would be the best and the motion was adopted without opposition.

### THE ADDRESS.

Following is the address adopted: "To His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia."

"May it please your Royal Highness, We, the Legislative Assembly of the House of Ontario, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach your royal highness for the purpose of presenting to you the congratulations of the Legislative Assembly on the occasion of your visit to this province."

"We hail with joy the presence on our soil of so distinguished a descendant of our late beloved Queen, and we assure your royal highness that in no part of the British Empire are the cordial relations which exist between the various branches of the Teutonic races regarded with more satisfaction than they are in Canada."

"We have in this province many thousands of citizens who regard with pride and affection the German Empire as their fatherland, and we have pleasure in assuring your royal highness that they exemplify in this comparatively new country those ways of frugality and industry and respect for law which are characteristic of the race to which they belong. In Canada, irrespective of nationality, your royal highness will be pleased to know that we rejoice in the achievements of German leadership in science and research, that we appreciate those elements of national character to which the German Empire owes in a large measure its national pride, and we are glad to believe that the influence of the empire in the councils of the nations tends to the advancement of the highest civilization and the liberty of the human race."

"We regret that your royal highness' official arrangements will not allow you to make an extended tour of this province, but we are glad to believe that another occasion may be found for becoming acquainted with the national resources and political institutions of a country to which we will be glad to welcome your fellow-subjects who for any reasons might wish to make Canada their future home."

"Respectfully submitted on behalf of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario."

Mr. Duff asked the government whether their attention had been called to the fact that emigrants from Great Britain, at the rate of 4,000 monthly, had been arranged for; also whether it was the intention of the government to take any steps to obtain any number of those for Ontario, and if so, what?

Mr. Davis replied that the government was making arrangements to secure as many of them as possible for Ontario.
