

SERBIA'S NEW SOVEREIGN RECEIVES WARM WELCOME

Great Enthusiasm Greeted His
Arrival at Belgrade.

RUSSIA AND AUSTRIA THERE

Ministers of Other European Powers
Were Not Present—Streets Lined
With Imperial Troops.

Belgrade, June 24.—King Peter arrived here at seven o'clock this morning. He was received with great enthusiasm.

The ministers, government officials, judges, municipal and military authorities and leading citizens were assembled on the platform of the railroad station, which was profusely decorated. The only foreign representatives who participated in the reception of the king were the Russian minister, M. Tcharykoff, and the Austrian minister, Herr Dumba, with the members of their respective legations. A guard of honor, with a band, saluted as King Peter descended from his car and greeted the cabinet ministers. The premier, M. Avakumovic, introduced M. Tcharykoff to the king, and the Russian minister presented the Austrian minister. Thus the Austrian minister had no intercourse with the provisional government, with which thus far he has had no relations.

A procession was then formed and the king proceeded to the cathedral. The streets were lined with troops and crowded with people, who had been pouring into Belgrade from the provinces during the last day or two. After the celebration of a mass, which was attended with all the splendor of the eastern church, King Peter drove in state to the new palace.

Although the king's entry into Belgrade was distinguished by a diplomatic boycott, his reception by the people was everywhere marked by heartiness, which approached genuine enthusiasm, in which all classes participated.

The officials were in uniform and wore all their decorations. The workers were engaged all night long in finishing the erection of Venetian masts and triumphal arches. The king's entry into the kingdom, when the train drove to the bridge connecting Serbia with Austria.

The king's arrival has awakened the people out of the attitude of indifference which they had assumed since the assassinations of King Alexander and Queen Draga. From the moment King Peter left the train and the band welcomed him with playing the Serbian national air, his progress was followed by prolonged, hearty cheers and shouts of "Long live Peter the First," which were repeated at intervals.

The premier made a speech before the king's departure from the railroad station, welcoming his majesty and expressing his appreciation of his election to the throne. The king then exchanged greetings with the cabinet ministers, including Col. Machin, minister of public works, who took a leading part in the assassination and interference with the king's departure from the railroad station.

On leaving the cathedral King Peter was again welcomed with shouts of "Long live the King."

After his arrival at the new palace the king received an address of welcome from the Skupstina.

NAMED AGENCIES OF EVIL
W. C. T. U. Enumerate Places
Which Increase Drinking.

Members of Union Consider Liquor
Situation in London.

At the regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. on Tuesday afternoon in Somerset Hall arrangements were made for the filling of a large box to be sent to the lumber camps in Algoma and Muskoka. The members of the union also spent some time considering the situation in London so far as the sale of liquor was concerned. "The liquor traffic in our city" was the topic for prayer, and there were enumerated in a five-minute address the agencies that are daily contributing to the increase of drinking and drunkenness, among them being the forty-one licensed places, the barracks, the club, the wholesale liquor store, the houses of ill repute, the breweries and the private home where liquor is promiscuously offered to guests.

Reports of eleven departments were received, the greater part of the interest being in that of the committee on missionary work in the lumber camps of Algoma and Muskoka. A letter was read to show that in one of the places in Algoma—and it was supposed to be the same in others—people had taken up land, with no money to buy the implements or to build homes, and were without the common comforts of life. Another letter contained the expressions of thanks from the lumber camps in the Muskoka and Rainy River districts are also to be prepared. Donations are requested from any of the outside unions or other friends.

The first meetings in July and August have been abandoned.

Not Guilty of "Raging."
Cape Town, June 24.—The court-martial in the case of several officers accused of "raging," found the prisoners not guilty on all the charges.

Plancon's dispatch and presented by order of the Russian Government on April 18. In a few days we shall learn the whole truth. Russia meanwhile waits calmly, and time is on her side.

RUSSIAN ROYALTY AS ANARCHISTS

Prince Nakhichidze and Wife
Expelled From France.

RELATED TO IMPERIAL FAMILY

The Prince Has Declared Himself
the Legitimate Heir to the
Russian Throne.

Paris, June 24.—Two Russian anarchists, Prince Victor Nakhichidze and his wife, whose expulsion from France had been decreed, were arrested today at Thonon-les-Bains, Haute-Savoie, on the south shore of Lake Geneva. They will be escorted to the frontier.

The prince is said to belong to one of the most illustrious families of Russia, closely related to the imperial family. The Russian authorities regard the prince as being an anarchist leader of an exceptionally dangerous character, as shown, it is claimed, by the fact that they track him from place to place and secure his expulsion and imprisonment whenever possible. The prince has on some occasions asserted that he is a legitimate pretender to the throne of Russia.

Princess Nakhichidze enjoys the distinction of having been condemned to death in Russia as one of the principal leaders of the Skopovka conspiracy. She has studied medicine and holds a diploma as a physician. Although the facts are not publicly known, it is asserted that the prince and princess have at various times been expelled from Germany, Spain, Austria and Italy, at the request of the Russian police.

INSULTED THE KING

The Roumanian Monarch Scored by
Serbian Army Officers.

Vienna, June 24.—Advices from Bucharest say the King of Roumania has received an insolent telegram signed by several officers of the Sixth Serbian Infantry, of which regiment he recently resigned the honorary colonelcy. The officers declare in an offensive language that King Charles is not competent to judge their actions, saying that he himself ascended the throne of Roumania after a military breach of faith, and add that the officers forgo with pleasure the distinction of their regiment bearing the Roumanian king's name.

ADVISES RETALIATION

A Chicago Preacher Tells Negroes to
Purchase Shotguns.

Chicago, June 24.—At a meeting of colored people held last night to protest against the lynching of the negro, David T. Wyatt, at Belleville, Ill., recently, Rev. C. H. Thomas, one of the speakers, advised his hearers that they should, if the hanging and burning of colored men is not stopped by the regular authorities, sell their coats and buy guns with which to defend themselves. Other speakers expressed similar sentiments, and before the meeting adjourned the negroes were worked up to a high pitch of excitement. Mrs. Ida Wells Barnett informed the men that they must organize to fight their own battles, saying that they never could expect the white men to fight for them until they had shown themselves capable of fighting for themselves.

MEXICO'S ANCIENT CITY

Ruins of a City of Pyramids Dis-
covered in the Forest.

Chicago, June 24.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Mexico City says: The recent discovery of an ancient city of pyramids in a dense forest in a remote part of the state of Puebla, has been found to be of great archaeological importance. The Federal Government has commissioned the sub-director of the National Museum, Senor F. Rodriguez, to visit the ruins. Nicholas Leon, an archaeologist and ethnologist, accompanied the sub-director to the ruins. Dr. Leon reports that the ruins are such as never before have been known to the world of science, and the most primitive ever discovered in Mexico, in fact, so ancient as to require a great deal of time and study to learn in which epoch they were built as well as by what people.

AN ANTI-RITUAL CRUSADE

An English Church Clergyman Starts
One in America.

New York, June 24.—The first shot in an anti-ritual crusade in this country, long a dream of John Kenail, who lost his life in a church riot in England, was fired by the Rev. R. C. Fillingham, vicar of Hexton, England, in a letter to Bishop Potter. The vicar is here arranging for the change which will begin next February. In his communication to Bishop Potter he denounced last Sunday's service in the church of St. Mary the Virgin in this city as "scandalous and unlawful proceedings." In his letter he says: "The whole service is a flagrant defiance of Protestantism. The Catholic ritual is being introduced into the church of England was reformed especially to get rid of the mass, but on Sunday morning it is openly and maliciously introduced. The proceedings culminated in the elevation and adoration of the elements of bread and wine."

THE DELAWARE LYNCHING

One Man Implicated and Arrested by
the Police.

Wilmington, Del., June 24.—The arrest of Arthur Corwell, who was taken into custody last night on suspicion of being implicated in the lynching of George White, the negro murder victim, is the only arrest made thus far. Corwell was taken into custody on Monday night. He will be arraigned for a preliminary hearing on a charge of murder as soon as the authorities can make the necessary arrangements. It is reported that other arrests will follow, but the attorney-general said today that no additional warrants had been issued and that he did not know whether any more would be sworn.

Attacked the Circus.

San Juan, Porto Rico, June 24.—A mob of about 300 persons at Coamo last night attacked the circus. The employees defended themselves with guns until a sufficient force of police arrived and quelled the disorder. Ten persons were wounded. The riot was caused by the refusal of the circus management to issue complimentary tickets.

The Chinese Indemnity.

London, June 24.—The Times correspondent at Shanghai telegraphs that Wu Han-shan, the Chinese minister at Washington, who was recently ordered to Peking in connection with the negotiations concerning the revision of treaties and the indemnity, has been permitted to remain in Washington until the American treaty is completed.

Jewel Thieves Caught.

Chicago, June 24.—The police last night arrested Charles Belmont and John Erzyall, who are charged with the theft of jewels valued at \$15,000 from the safe of the Hotel Alcazar, in Los Angeles, California. The robbery occurred October 28, 1902, and from that time until last night nothing had been heard of the two men. At the time of the theft Belmont was employed as clerk of the hotel, and Erzyall was a bell boy. The jewels had been placed in the safe by Mrs. J. J. Webster, of Brooklyn, N. Y.

LAST CHAPTER MOAT MYSTERY

Dougal Was Found Guilty and
Sentenced to Death.

MURDERER OFFERED NO DEFENSE
And Remained Unmoved While the
Evidence Was Being Piled Up
Against Him.

London, June 24.—Another chapter in the now famous Moat House mystery was closed yesterday, when Samuel Herbert Dougal was found guilty of the murder of Miss Camille Holland and was sentenced to death. The trial took place at Chelmsford, commencing Monday, and Dougal, who offered no defense, listened throughout and, apparently unmoved by the strong circumstantial evidence given against him, Miss Holland, who was a wealthy woman, well educated, but eccentric, went to live with Dougal, a stalwart man, about fifty years of age. They rented a roomy old building known as the Moat House, at Saffron-Walden, Essex. One day, according to the evidence of their housekeeper, Dougal and Miss Holland departed in a trap, ostensibly for the station, it being said that it had been decided to visit friends. Dougal returned without her, and no one ever saw her alive again. Her body was found buried in the Moat House grounds, with a bullet wound in the head. Dougal was then charged with murdering her.

Chinese Government Rewards Crime
With Gifts of Office.

Victoria, B. C., June 24.—Evidence given in Hong Kong on June 2 at the trial of the murderers of the reform leader, Yung Kue Wan, proved that the Chinese Government had rewarded assassins to murder the reformer, who had been connected with the Wanchow rising of 1906.

A reward of \$20,000 and official rank was offered for the capture or assassination of the reformer. It was shown that La Ka Chik, magistrate of Canton, organized, and with Yung Ching Kai, commander of the Chinese warship Kien Yui, came to Hong Kong to supervise the murder. Four men committed the deed and returned to Hong Kong, where they were paid the reward and made mandarins.

\$5,000 Missing.

Brockville, Ont., June 24.—The theft of a registered package, containing \$5,000, mailed from Montreal to the Molsons Bank, Smiths Falls, a few weeks ago, via Brockville, is being made the subject of a thorough investigation by the department of the Postmaster-General. In connection with this investigation, two Pinkerton detectives have been in Brockville for several days. The package was missed after the transfer of the mails from the Grand Trunk to the Canadian Pacific Railway.

HOYLE, N. ONTARIO, TAKES UP DEBATE

And Carries On the Opposition
Abuse and Insult.

A CORRESPONDENT IN TROUBLE

Is Said to Have Sent Mr. Pettypiece
an Insulting Message—Mr.
Gibson Speaks.

Toronto, Ont., June 24.—On the opening of the Legislature this morning the Attorney-General stated that a member of the press gallery employed on the Toronto News had sent an offensive message to Mr. Pettypiece while that member was speaking yesterday. Mr. Gibson said he hoped the offender would voluntarily appear at the bar of the House and apologize for his action. Mr. Whitney concurred in the remarks of the Attorney-General. Mr. Hoyle (North Ontario) the first speaker of the day, said that it would have been infinitely preferable to have an investigation before a better garden committee of the House than to receive such a report as had been given by the judges. The attack made by Mr. Pettypiece on S. H. Blake was an unwarranted one, Mr. Blake was probably as true a Liberal as ever lived in the House. He had been forced to withdraw his support from the Government because of the prevailing conditions.

Mr. Hoyle then quoted Bystander's comment on the finding in the Weekly Sun, in which it was stated the judiciary had been dragged into the mire of a political quarrel and that the finding had shaken few in their belief that Mr. Cannon had been bribed with the knowledge of the leaders of the Government. Mr. Hoyle said that the Premier's request that the House should blindly adopt the report as a fair and impartial one brought vividly to his mind the definition of faith as the substance of things hoped for, and the evidence of things unseen. The report was a substance not only hoped for but obtained by the Government while the evidence of things not seen was very apparent.

Mr. Hoyle, after delving deeply into the English political history of the nineteenth century, ended with the stereotyped sentiment that "it was not for a change." Hon. J. M. Gibson then took the floor on behalf of the Government. He referred to Mr. Whitney's complaint that Mr. Hoyle had for years absented himself from the House whenever he (Mr. Pattullo) was off. This was true, said Mr. Gibson, and such an action was to be deprecated.

Mr. Whitney, arising, said that such an assertion as Mr. Pattullo's was a bold, bald impertinence, even if the charge was true, as it was not.

THE CHINESE REBELLION

Rebels Troop French Church and
Destroy Helpless.

Victoria, B. C., June 24.—The steamer Athenian, which reached port on Monday from the Orient, brought news that the insurrection in Yunnan is causing grave alarm.

A Peking dispatch of June 4 says the Yunnan insurgents now number more than 50,000. They are well armed and armed with weapons of improved pattern. So far the Government forces have fared badly in encounters with the rebels. From refugees who came from Shih Ping, it has been learned that the Chinese missionaries were destroyed and the missionaries fled to Yunnan for safety. Some of the priests were captured and murdered by the rebels.

DIED VERY SUDDENLY

by Paralytic Stroke.

Mrs. Eliza McKee, widow of the late William McKee, died last night at the Aged People's Home after suffering a paralytic stroke. Although Mrs. McKee had reached the age of 95 years, she had enjoyed good health up to yesterday.

Mrs. McKee was one of the oldest residents of this city, and was well-known and highly respected. She is survived by three sons, one of whom resides in Ingersoll. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon from the residence of her grand-daughter, Mrs. W. C. Brown, 71 Cartwright street.
