

## ESTIMATES FOR COUNTY COUNCIL

Treasurer McEvoy's Financial  
Statistics.

### MAY BUY PROOF LINE ROAD

Councillor Elson to Submit Propo-  
sition Along That Line at Thurs-  
day's Session.

The county council met yesterday for a two-hour session. Little definite business was carried through, but several important matters were laid before the members. Treasurer McEvoy presented his estimate of revenue and expenditures, which show that about \$5,000 more than was raised last year will have to be levied this year, owing to the increased expenditure on account of bridges. Proposed amendments to the hawkers' and peddlers' bylaw were discussed. Councillor Elson gave notice of a motion which will be of special interest to the farmers of London township and the northern part of the county.

**COMMUNICATIONS.**  
Communications were read and referred as follows:  
A. P. McDougall, clerk of Ekfrid township, notified the council that the cost of suppressing the outbreak of smallpox in that township was \$1,091.52. He asked for the customary grant. Referred to finance committee.  
R. W. Cuddy, secretary-treasurer of the West Middlesex Teachers' Association, presented the financial statement of the association and asked for the annual grant. The statement showed receipts of \$272.50, expenditures of \$155.85, and a balance of \$116.65. Referred to finance committee.

The amount levied last year was \$44,294.48. The estimates were referred to the finance committee.

**AMENDING PEDDLERS' BYLAW.**  
The amendments to the hawkers' and peddlers' bylaw were discussed at length. One amendment is the lowering of license fees to meet the requirements of a change in the Ontario act since the old bylaw was passed.

Other amendments are designed to mitigate the nuisance of irresponsible agents and traders. Action on the bylaw was deferred to allow the solicitor to advise the council as to the power given by the act.

**TO PURCHASE THE PROOF LINE.**  
Mr. Elson gave notice that he would on Thursday move that a bylaw be passed to sanction the purchase of the Proof Line road, under an act known as the act for the improvement of highways, passed 1901.

**MR. KRUGER'S CASE.**  
The Chamberlain proclamation of last September has been allowed to lapse, since no Boer leader can be condemned to exile or be deprived of property if he is not mentioned in the agreement, but apparently he will not be liable under the fourth article to any proceedings, civil or criminal, if he returns to Pretoria.

**REJOICING IN CONCENTRATION CAMPS.**  
Pretoria, Transvaal, Monday, June 2.—There was great rejoicing in all the concentration camps upon receipt of the news that peace had been concluded. The occupants assembled in the open squares and sang psalms, the women weeping with joy.

Arrangements are being made to send representatives of each unit of the British army in the coronation festivities in London.

**OVER 25,000 BOER PRISONERS.**  
London, June 2.—Answering a question in the House of Commons today, the war secretary, Mr. Brodrick, said the total number of Boer prisoners in South Africa and elsewhere was 25,555, of whom 783 were under 16, and 1,025 over 60 years of age.

The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, answering a question, finally announced that it was not proposed to remove the tax on grain from the budget.

**GLAD PRISONERS.**  
Bombay, British India, June 2.—In the Boer camps here a majority of the prisoners rejoiced over the news of peace in South Africa, but many considered it bad because it meant the loss of all their fighting and the years without complaint, said many of the Boers, "had such been the judgment of the burghers."

**THANKSGIVING SERVICE.**  
London, June 3.—King Edward will attend a thanksgiving service in St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday, June 8. The lord mayor, Sir Joseph O. Dimsdale, will be present in state.

**MESSAGE FROM THE POPE.**  
Rome, June 3.—Monseigneur Stormer, the archbishop of Treviso, officially communicated to the Pope yesterday the news of the termination of the war in South Africa. His holiness answered: "God be blessed. I pray you to communicate to the British Government the fact that the news has filled me with content."

**SITUATION IN CAPE COLONY.**  
Cape Town, June 3.—Sir John Gordon Spragg, premier of Cape Colony, during a meeting of the colonial secretary had informed him that the imperial government did not contemplate the suspension of the constitution of Cape Colony.

The premier further declared that the "disfranchisement of the rebels of Cape Colony will defeat our enemies in the house as effectively as they have been beaten in the field."

The premier said that at the colonial conference to be held in London at the coronation he intended to uphold free trade within the empire.

Consistent opposition to the premier's views developed among the audience, while the crowd outside the hall was so hostile that some of the windows were broken with stones.

The number of immigrants arriving in New York during the first quarter of this year is 178,000, which is 30,000 in excess of that for any preceding quarter.

The article in common use as food which has the greatest food value in proportion to cost is cornmeal; the article having greatest cost in proportion to its food value is the oyster.

Austria is perfecting a new type of siege cannon. Italy's new field gun has a range of 7,000 yards. The whole Russian artillery is now being armed with pulk-fling weapons.

The imperial marine customs values the exports from China to the United States in 1901 at \$11,932,551.36. The total trade of exports and imports between the United States and China is \$42,000,000 per annum.

## PEOPLE IN NO MOOD FOR CRITICISING

Britain Was Magnanimous  
With the Brave Boers.

### NO SIGNS OF EXULTATION

Gen. Dewet the First to Sign the  
Terms of Surrender—Rejoicing in  
Concentration Camps.

London, June 3.—Neither the metro-  
politan nor the nation is in a mood for a critical examination of the terms of peace. Every British flag is flying, and every English face is beaming with joy and relief over the close of a war which has cost £223,000,000 and 21,000 lives.

### NO EXULTATION OVER THE BOERS.

Grotesque and noisy as was the demonstration in London over the return of peace, there was no sign of exultation over the fallen Boer forced to surrender after a long and desperate fight. The English crowds in this respect were as merciful and magnanimous as the government, which had made peace on most generous terms. The terms were so magnanimous that even pro-Boer radicals in parliament found little fault with them. Such criticism as was heard among members was based upon the

shown by the government, and the apparent lack of safeguards against the reopening of military operations after the release of the prisoners. The compromise on the language question was also regarded by aggressive Unionists as a source of future disturbance.

There was much comment upon the official recognition of the new republic of the Orange Free State in the first article of the agreement, and the explanation was offered that this revival of the dignity of the Boer nation, and wandering governments was not without utility, since it enabled Lord Kitchener and Lord Milner to remain the Cape and Natal rebels to the mercies of their own governments.

## DOMINION CABINET BUSY

Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier  
Sail June 12.

Military Contingent To Be Vaccinated—Every Place in the Corps Filled.

Ottawa, June 3.—The cabinet will be very busy almost daily from now until the 12th inst., when the premier, accompanied by Lady Laurier, will leave for New York to take passage for England. Sir Wilfrid and his family will sail from New York in the Etruria on June 14. On the same date Messrs. Mulock, Paterson and Fielding will leave Montreal in the Tunisian.

Lord Minto sails on the Parisian, nation ceremonies. He will be accompanied by Lady Ruby Elliott and his private secretary, Mr. Sladen. Major Maude remains in Canada.

The coronation contingent will have to be vaccinated, or at least those members of it who have not recently undergone vaccination. Orders to that effect come from the Imperial authorities today. The impression has gone out that there are some vacancies in the contingent, and the department of militia is being inundated with applications from men desirous to go. All such applicants are being informed that every place in the contingent is filled.
