PEOPLE IN NO MOOD

Britain Was Magnanimous With the Brave Boers.

SIGNS OF EXULTATION

Gen. Dewet the First to Sign the Terms of Surrender Rejoicing in Concentration Camps.

London, June 3 .- Neither the metropolis nor the nation is in a mood for a critical examination of the terms of peace. Every British flag is flying, and every English face is beaming with joy and relief over the close of a war which has cost £223,000,000 and 21.000 lives.

NO EXULTATION OVER THE BOERS.

Grotesque and noisy as was the demonstration in London over the return of peace, there was no sign of exultation over the fallen Boer forced to surrender after a long and desperate fight. The English crowds in this respect were as merciful and magnanimous as the government, which had

made peace on most generous terms. The terms were so magnanimous that even pro-Boer radicals in parliament found little fault with them. Such criticism as was heard among mem-

bers was based upon the EXTRAORDINARY LENIENCY: shown by the government, and the apparent lack of safeguards against the reopening of military operations after the release of the prisoners. The compromise on the language question was also regarded by aggressive Unionists as a source of future dis-

turbance. The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, answering a question, finally announced that it was not proposed to remove the tax on grain from the budget.

GLAD PRISONERS. Bombay, British India, June 3.-In the Boer prison camps here a majority of the prisoners rejoiced over the news of peace in South Africa, but many considered it bad because it meant the loss of all they fought for. 'We would have stayed in captivity for years without complaint," said many of the Boers, "had such been the judgment of the burghers."

THANKSGIVING SERVICE. London, June 3.-King Edward will attend a peace thanksgiving service in St. Paul's Cathedral Sunday, June 8. The lord mayor, Sir Joseph O. Dims-dale, will be present in state.

MESSAGE FROM THE POPE. Rome, June 3.-Monsignor Stormer, the archbishop of Trebizond, officially communicated to the Pope yesterday the news of the termination of the war in South Africa. His holiness answered: "God be blessed. I pray you to communicate to the British Government the fact that the news has filled

SITUATION IN CAPE COLONY. Cape Town, June 3 .- Sir John Gordon Sprigg, premier of Cape Colony, during a meeting here yesterday, announced that the colonial secretary had informed him that the imperial government did not contemplate the suspension of the constitution of Cape

Colony. The premier further declared that the "disfranchisement of the rebels of Cape Colony will defeat our enemies in the house as effectually as they have been beaten in the field.'

The premier said that at the colonial conference to be held in London at the coronation he intended to uphold free trade within the empire. Considerable opposition to the premier's views developed among the audience, while the crowd outside the hall was so hostile that some of the windows were broken with stones.
