VARSITY DEFEATED QUEEN'S AT TORONTO

Blue and White Had an Easy
Time With Kingston
Team.

FINAL SCORE WAS 12 TO 6

Queens Played Much Better in Second
Half, Scoring Five Goals to
Their Opponents' Three.

In the intercollegiate senior game at Savina rink last night, University of Toronto defeated Queen's University of Kingston by the score of 12 to 6, the winners leading at half time by 9 to 1. Varsity had decidedly the better of the argument in the initial half of the game, completely outplaying Queen's at every stage. Their shooting, combination and checking back were a treat to the fans, and they did not let up till the gong sounded for the resting period. Queen's were very slow in this half, but braced up a little when Hunt replaced Box at centre, and were pressing hard for the remainder of the half.

Queen's showed a complete reversal of form in the second half, and kept the blue and white continually on the defensive. Their three-man combination was worked to a nicety and to good effect. Parker was called on to stop many a well-directed shot. Queen's defence also took a decided brace in this half, and intercepted passes and used their bodies to advantage.

For Queen's, Trimble, George and Hunt were the pick of the team, although every man played a good game in the last half. Sitter in goal was away off color in the first half and let almost every shot get past him. He improved, however, as the game progressed.

Blakeslee was easily the best man on the ice, his work assisting very materially in winning the game for Varsity. "Pete" German at cover played one of the best games of his career, and was very ably assisted by Hanley at point. Parker in goal played his usual clever game, and stopped them from all sides, especially in the last half. The teams lined up as follows:

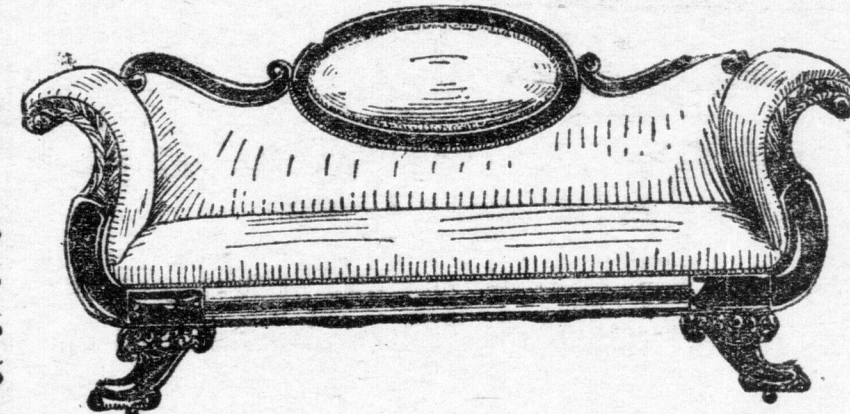

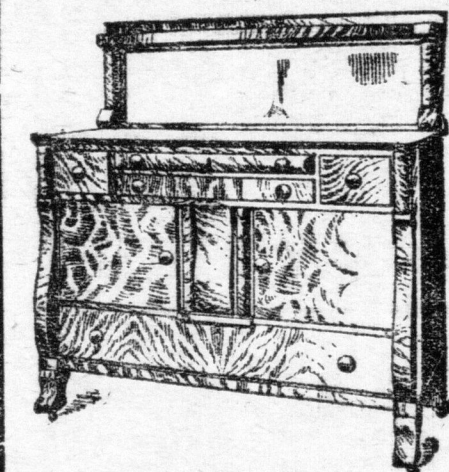
