CAROLINE COE'S TESTED RECIPES

Baked Beans. Soak 4 cups of beans overnight in cold water. In the morning add fresh cold water and cook slowly until the skins begin to burst. Pour off water, and turn beans in bean pot or jar. Bury in the beans % pound of fat salt pork. To 1 cup boiling water; add 1 tablespoon salt. 1 tablespoon molasses, 3 tablespoons sugar, and pour over beans. Add enough boiling water to cover beans, and more if needed during cooking. Cover the bean jar and bake slowly from 6 to 8 hours. Mustard may be added if the flavor is preferred. This quantity should

serve eight persons. Lentil Croquettes. Use split peas if desired. Soak 1/2 cup lentils or split peas overnight. of suffrage. Cook with one stalk of celery until soft, or about two hours. Drain and Add 1 cup stale breadcrumbs, 1 egg, 34 table-spoon melted butter, a few drops onion juice, and salt and pepper. shape into croquettes. Roll in crumbs, then in egg, then in crumbs again, and fry in deep fat.

there is often a foreign elemnt to be reckoned with. The writer in several years' experience in our rural schools, has usually found that parents of defective children have those children under their own doctor's care, or, on a word from the teacher, will seek a physician's advice. The parents of Middlesex are not guilty in that respect. However, perhaps the enthusiasts on medical inspection have no children attending school and so they have time to look after other people's.

Let the Women's Institute look after the making of ideal homes and they will do more for "Home and Country" than by wasting energy where there is already trained ability looking after our schools.

However, if they are taking the needs of our rural schools seriously to heart, one of our county inspectors suggests the great need of truant officers in the townships and also the eed of more attractive sur for the teachers in order that more efficient work may be accomplished than is possible under existing conditions. Our schools suffer from an overdose of fads and experiments. Surely the home will share some of the burden of child training and not eave everything for the school to do. Is there any great need of trying to force medical inspection on our rural schools? Do the parents want it?
