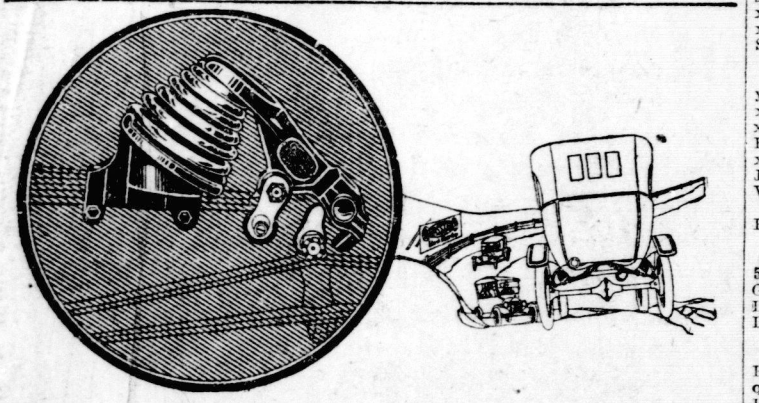

JEANETTE RANKIN REPEATS AT TOLEDO

Cox Drives E. Colorado To Win in 2:05 Trot.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 5.—Jeanette Rankin repeated as a consistent winner today, carrying Lou McDonald home with victory in the feature race of the day's program at Port Miami track, the Toledo Blade \$5,000 stake for 2:14 trotters.

McDonald won the first two heats easily, but was crowded out at the finish by White's Princess Etawah. The Steadman \$3,000 stake for 2:05 trotters went to E. Colorado with Cox up, after Harry Stokess had piloted Peter Coley home in front of the field in the first heat. Peter Coley never had a chance thereafter, however, as Cox took his bay horse out in front at the start and kept him there.

The other stake race on the card, the Toledo Times \$2,000 stake for three-year-old trotters, went in straight heats to Tommy Murphy behind Siladar. A fourth heat was necessary to decide the winner in the 2:08 pace for \$1,200. Harry Gray, with Maybelle Direct, took the first; Nat Ray's J. V. S. second, and Wrack, driven by Paine, the third. In the run-off Maybelle was the winner in a close finish.
