Courtesy To Be Watchword Of London People This Week

Kiwanis Club Stages Period of General Urbanity—Will Meet Friday To Report Results.

With formal recognition from city educators, "Courtesy Week" in which this city will be engaged beginning yesterday, is expected to make London a regular paradise of etiquette. The Kiwanis Club is to be credited with the idea of staging the "good-mannered period." Commencing yesterday every member has pledged himself to be a real model of urbanity during the week. And it is hoped policemen, street car conductors and gang bosses will benefit by the example.

"In this rapid transit age, most of us forget the little amenities that make life worth while," said an official of the Kiwanis Club. "Courtesy has become almost a relic of past ages, due to the competitive nature of woman's occupations. A lot of the year devoted to consideration of the other fellow, and practice of every respect toward women, will have the effect of making good manners more or less a habit. Every city in Canada is holding a similar courtesy celebration, and London will be right up to scratch."

No attempt will be made to secure the co-operation of clergymen in laying the proposition before their congregations, as has been done in Toronto. The Kiwanis members will advertise the festival by word of mouth, and anyone departing from the special edicts of the week will be severely reprimanded.

One of the great questions at stake is whether Lions and other clubs will exclude smoking at their weekly luncheons. Non-smokers opined today that in consideration for them, habitual smokers will forego the pleasure of inhaling the fragrant root during the period. On the other hand, smokers state that non-smokers will be courteous enough not to voice the slightest objection to cigarette and pipe fumes.

"I believe courtesy an indispensable quality of happy living," said C. B. King, manager of the London street railway. "The Kiwanis Club is to be commended for fostering the habit. We have always impressed on our employees the necessity for politeness to customers, and I believe they are doing their best to follow our instructions."

As soon as the celebration is well under way, the schools are expected to take hold of the idea, and every effort has been assured that children will be shown the desirability of practicing good manners during the week.

On Friday the Kiwanis Club will meet to report results. Every member will be asked to tell stories illustrating the effect the propaganda for courtesy has had on the public mind, and if any degree of success is noted, the event will become a yearly feature of the club's activities.

LOCAL CONTROL OF RAILWAYS IS URGED BY BOARD

Hydro-Electric Inquiry Commission Submits Report On Tecumseh Electric Line.

PRICE WAS EXCESSIVE Report Recommends Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg System Change Hands.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, April 17.—Local control of the operation of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway is advocated by the hydro-electric inquiry commission in a lengthy report on its investigations of the purchase and operation of these railways of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, of which Sir Adam Beck is chairman. The report which is signed by W. D. Greer, chairman, and his fellow commissioners, gives the opinion that there would be a more complete degree of co-operation between the management and the public, and a service more satisfactory to the public would be given, if these enterprises were under local control.

Another clause of the report says: "The expenditures of the commission for engineering and accounting and other expenses, prior to the agreement, and which have been capitalized and a portion of which is being written off each year, were made out of the general funds of the commission without any appropriation therefore by the legislature and without legal warrant of authority."

No Statutory Power. "The acquisition by the commission of the shares of the capital stock of Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway and the agreement to purchase the assets and properties of that railway and the Windsor and Tecumseh Electric Railway, and all the negotiations and proceedings in connection therewith were during the period preceding June 1, 1920, when the hydro radial act of that year was enacted, without legal warrant of authority and entirely ultra vires, there being until June 1, 1920, no statutory power or authority in the commission to acquire a railroad or shares in a railway. Assuming obligations and adopting procedure without legal authority but in the expectation that legislation will be enacted confirming what has been done, should not be permitted. The question as to whether or not it is advisable for the commission to construct, purchase or operate railways will be dealt with by us in a later report."

"Sir Adam Beck stated to us that the price paid Detroit United Railway may have been excessive. The price paid, however, was the lowest the vendors would accept, and the municipalities interested agreed to pay the price. The road is now of undoubted excellence of construction. The increased efficiency of service, which should result from the large expenditure made for improvements has not as yet been fully attained."

Future Looks Bright. "The favorable prospect of a largely increased population in the localities leads us to the conclusion that efficient and economical administration of the railways should be their way. A reduction of head office administration expenses (\$29,666.31 for the fiscal year ending October 31, 1921) should be made. The establishment of a renewal fund by the commission was proper and necessary."

"The fares charged prior to the taking over of the system by the commission were a cash fare of five cents or six tickets for twenty-five cents. The rates now are six tickets for thirty-five cents or twenty tickets for one dollar. The rates now charged are higher than those that the commission led the residents of the districts served to expect."

"There is no sound reason why the two railways in question should be exempted from payment of the provincial tax. If under the existing law they are entitled to this exemption, the law should be amended."

Urges Expert Advice. "The amount of the insurance premium paid is large, and the commission might well secure expert advice on the subject of insurance with the view of ascertaining whether or not a substantial reduction of premium might not be secured."

"A committee representing all the municipalities directly interested in the railways, and which would be a medium for conveying to the commission the views of the municipalities and ratemakers on all questions of operation might well be formed. Full information as to the financial condition of the undertaking and all phases of operation should be published regularly."

"Reconstruction is now completed."

WORLD'S LARGEST PASSION PLAY IS OPENED AT TURIN

Actors Numbering 2,000 Take Part In the Gigantic Production.

MAY TOUR AMERICA

Finance Problem Stands In Way of Plans To Visit the United States

Special Cable to The London Advertiser and The Philadelphia Eagle-Leader. Rome, April 17.—The world's largest Passion Play has opened at Turin. It is an even larger production than the Oberammergau and may go to America if directors find the means to finance the enormous cost of transporting the choruses and property. The Passion play includes several Bavarian native actors but the character of Christ is played by Alberto Pasquali, a well-known dramatic actor who has played in several Biblical plays for the films in Italy.

The Turin Passion play differs largely from the original production of the choir of five hundred male voices is drawn from the Rome Polyphonic Choir and the Palestina Male Choir in Turin. Famous chants, written nearly six hundred years ago at the behest of the Ecumenical council of Trent, have been resurrected for the occasion, forming with Bach's chorales the main portion of the musical program.

In comparison with the Oberammergau production that at Turin is on a more grandiose scale. Instead of a tiny stage, set amid the Bavarian Alps, the Turin stage covers 8,000 square yards. The action on the Mount of Olives has been arranged with almost natural proportions.

Two thousand actors take part on the stage, while the seating accommodation in the stadium which, for athletic games, contains 100,000 comfortably, have been limited to 25,000. Several million lire spent on production, which will continue daily until the end of May.
