Mercury Gold Excites Tokio

Scientist Promises To Reveal Secret in November.

Tokio, Sept. 22.—Tokio is excited over the alleged discovery of a method of transmuting mercury into gold cheaply, using 170 volts to break up the "structure of the spectral lines of the mercury atom." Dr. Hantaro Nagaoka of the government physical chemical experiment station, the largest in Japan, succeeded in experiments three times and promises to reveal the secret to the world in November. He adds it will have the gravest effects on present day chemistry and physics.
