## Butcher Trade at Toronto Live Stock Yards Slow, With Many Leftovers.

Canadian Press Despatch.  
Toronto, Feb. 10.—Leftovers from yesterday totalled 1,000 head. Butcher trade opened dull with few early sales. Export steers are fairly active at \$7 to \$8.25. Store cattle sold steadily at \$4 to \$6.75 per hundredweight.  
Calves are slow, with prices 50c lower, with the best ranging from \$11 to \$12.50.  
Hogs are steady at \$11.75 off carcass.

Ordinary lambs sold from \$13 to \$15.50 with a few choice at \$17. Good sheep sold up to \$8.50.
