THE PRISONER'S "SPEECH."

The statement or speech of Guiteau is a long, rambling conglomeration of stuff about insanity, politics religion and other things. If the prisoner is not insane, the statement bears strong evidences of an attempt to make the public believe him to be off his mental balance. It reviews his own life from boyhood; the records of his family; the methods of Noyes' Oneida community, the methods of Noyes' Oneida community, of which Guiteau was a member for five years; and a host of information about this thing and that thing. In one passage he says: "Insanity runs in my family; my father had two sisters and a nephew and a neice in an insane asylum. My father himself was a monomaniac for twenty-five years on the 'Oneida community. He thought Noyes a greater man than the Lord Jesus Christ." In another passage he says: "Let the newspapers change from 'Guiteau the assassin' to 'Guiteau the patriot.'"
