New York, April 23- Mr. Thomas Brennan, the first secretary of the land league and recently one of the secretaries of league and recently one of the secretaries of the national league, arrived here on Wednesday evening by the steamer Vincenzio Floric, from Palermo, Italy. The name of Mr. Brennan was mentioned by Carey in his evidence. The latter did not say that Brennan was a member of the assassination Brennan was a member of the assassination society of the fenian brotherhood. Mr. Brennan was in London when Carey mentioned him in his evidence. He spent thirteen months in prison, on account of his connection with the land league. He was never brought to trial. He will attend the Philadelphia convention, and at present it is his intention to stay in this country for several months at least. Mr. Brennan is of the opinion that the dynamite policy and the policy of the land league cannot work in unison. He is opposed to the present method of dynamite warfare. It is remarkable that although Mr. Brennan is the most important Irish nationalist who has come here since the visit of Parnell and Dillon, with the exception, possibly, of Treasurer Egan, the New York papers have taken no notice of his arrival. He had Mr. Parnell's confidence during the whole period of the land league agitation, and probably knows more of the details of the history of that erganization than any man in this country, with the exception of Mr. Egan.
