KERWOOD.

Mr. de Gex states that at present he is sold out of all surplus stock except one grand young bull nearly twelve months old, a beautiful red roan from deep milking cow. Sales have been exceptionally good the past year, five heifers and one young bull going to Calgary, another young bull to British Columbia. We hear a lot nowadays about the high cost of living and the scarcity of beef animals. Unfortunately we have a number of men and some of them under government auspices in their anxiety to boom the dairy breeds tell the people there is no such thing as a dual purpose cow. You cannot have best and milk. The grand old short-horn from time immemorial have fully demonstrated the possibility of such a thing. We have the evidence on every side. One of my neighbors had three grade short-horn cows last year that averaged seventy-three dollars and forty-three cents for cream delivered at Kerwood factory, not counting the calves worth at least twenty dollars a head and household cream and skinn milk besides. It is indeed hard to pick up a load of steer to feed now without the objectionable taint of dairy blood. I do not know of any better sign of prosperity than eight or ten good big wide-backed roan or red cows with unusually high prices for both sheep and lambs. My experience has been the largest number of sales and the highest average yet. As the short-horn stands pre-eminently at the head of cattle so does the majestic Lincoln with his proud carriage lead all breeds of sheep. The finest fattened of the long woolled varieties, yielding a grand carcass of mutton, well streaked and lean and the heaviest fleece of wool, in fact, I have a special market for all wool thirteen inches long and upwards at double the price of unwashed articles. To show the popularity of the Lincoln, fifteen years ago you could count the Lincoln rams in this neighborhood on the fingers of one hand. Today they outnumber all other breeds put together and it is possible to buy a carload of shorn Lincoln two year old rams singly from the breeders. In conclusion I would say that this article is not written disparagingly of any breed but help you have a good thing pass it on and wish the other fellow.
