Another Earthquake.

Oct. 21—Prolonged earthquakes' shocks beginning at five o'clock this morning and lasting for several hours have been recorded on the instruments on the Isle of Wight and at Ljuboch, Austria. The distance of the disturbances is estimated at over three thousand miles.

Telegrams received here from St. Petersburg report earth shocks in Central Asia, at Latakurgun, Samarkand, Khokand and elsewhere, which caused the injury of collapse of many buildings. At Samarkand the shocks lasted intermittently from early morning until this afternoon. Two women were killed by falling houses, and the population is now camping out in the fields.

This is without doubt the same earthquake that was reported yesterday by the seismograph at Toronto and Washington.
