new dresses. It would have warmed the hearts of the kind friends who sent them if they could have seen the look of delight on the bright little faces. The supply of quilts is abundant, and they are a great blessing to the needy Indians here in protecting them from the cold north wind. The stockings and mittens also were much appreciated. I heartly thank all the kind Christian women who have exerted themselves so much for the comfort of the poor and destitute. I am very sorry I did not acknowledge receipt of the clothing sooner, and hope my delay has not caused you any trouble.

Miss Baker left last October to visit her friends in the East, and I am carrying on the work alone until she returns; so you see I am kept very busy. I like the work very much and we are getting on nicely at school, notwithstanding the many trials and discouragements; but there is sweet comfort in the words "Lo, I am with you always," and to know we have the sympathy and prayers of so many kind friends who are all engaged in the same good work for the Master.
