

SUMATRAN TIGERS.-In Sumaira, when a tiger enters a village, the foolish people prepare rice and fruits, and placing them at the entrance to the village, think that, by giving him this hospitable reception, he will be pleased with their intention, and pass on without doing them harm.

STRANGE PETS .- A Mrs. Lincoln, of Boston, has a couple of strange pets in an African lion-lioness, which are 21 months old. She has brought them up by the hand, being as free with them as any one would be with kittens, and has taught them a number of tricks. The male weighs 250 and the female 200 pounds; and, till recently, they have the full and unrestrained run of Mrs Lincoln's apartments, the smaller one even occupying the same bed with her at night. The police ordered certain restrictions, however, and now there is less chance of catastophe, should the beasts take a notion to taste human flesh.

NOVEL DISCOVERY IN NATURAL HISTORY .- A lecturer on natural history was called upon the other day to pay for a live rabbit which he had in a basket in a railway carriage, and which the ticketcollector said would be charged the same as a dog. The lecturer vainly explained that he was going to use the rabbit in illustration of a lecture he was about to give in a provincial town, and, indignantly taking a small live tortoise from bis pocket, said You'll be telling me next that this is a dog, and that I must pay for it also." The ticket-taker went for superior orders, and on his return delivered this lecture on natural history-"Cats is dogs, rabbits is dogs, but a tortus is a hinsect." The professor had to pay dog-fare for the rabbit.

INSTINCT OF BIRDS-Notwithstanding many opinions to the contrary, it seems certain that birds often die a natural death. One reason why their bodies are so rarely found is, that on the approach of death their instinct prompt them to creep away in some hole or under some cover, where they would be least liable to fall a prey to their natural enemies. It is doubtful if any of the game birds, like the pigeon and grouse, ever die of old age, or the semi-game birds, like bobolink, or the "century living" crow; but in what other form can death overtake the humming-bird, or even the swift and the barn-swallow? Such are true birds of the air; they may be occasionally lost at sea during their migrations, but, so far as is known, they are not preyed upon by any other species.

inhabits the warmer parts of South Americachiefly Paraguay and the Brazils. It is one of the most powerful of the feline after the tiger. It inhabits the forests, and seeks its prey by watching, or by openly seizing cattle in the enclosures. It climbs freely and expertly the tallest trees-even those without branches .- Horses, oxen, and sheep are his favorite seizures; and he can walk off with a horse without much difficulty. They are known to feed extensively upon turtles in places where these animals are found. They surprise them on the sand, and in order to devour them at their ease turn them in such manner that the under shell is uppermost. In this situation, the turtles cannot rise, and as the jaguar turns many more than he can ent in one night, the Indians often avail themselves of his cunning and malignant avidity. He pursues the turtle quite into the water, when not very deep, and also digs up the eggs, and together with the vulture, and the heron is the most cruel enemy of the little turtles recently hatched. jaguar will not attack man unless interfered with and it may be stated that he is usually hunted with dogs, which run him to bay, or make him take refuge in a tree, either to be shot or disabled with long spears by the hunters.

America, and especially throughout the Northern States, the boulders are numerous, often of great size, and indicating transits of many miles. Over the Eastern, Middle, and North-Western States, boulders, that have emigrated from different points to the northward, occur in such abundance that they may almost anywhere be found, if the inquirers will only examine the country he passes over. Upon Mount Katahdin, in the Moosehead region of Maine, stones can be seen lying over four thousand feet above the sea, fossilliferous in their nature and coming from the northern sites; while towards Mount Desert, masses, some forty to fitty feet in height, are sprinkled everywhere, and as in the case of the Dedham granite distributed to the south, invariably show northern origin. In Berkshire county, Massachusetts, these travelled rocks lie in long alignments, passing over the Lenox Hills, and extending generally in a south-easterly direction for fifteen or twenty miles, and have been filched from the Canan and Richmond Hills, across the line, in New York, being a chloritic slate, with angular specimens of limestone intermixed. Some granites from Vermont, on the west of the Green Mountains, have been lifted over these barriers and transferred to the southern margins of Massachusetts; while, in Vermont, a boulder weighing over thirty-four hundred tons, and known as the Green Mountain Giant, has been drifted from the Green Mountains easterly across the valley of the Deer field River, and planted five hundred feet above the stream. In Michigan, near the Menomonee River, a field upon with boulders, so that a mile can be traversed without once touching the ground. 



THE CARRYING POWER OF THE GLACIERS .- In North the northern slope of a mountain is densely covered

THE ISLAND OF JAVA .- It is strange that more travellers do not visit Java for its beauty, or that more do not visit Canton for its political and social interests. Newer scenes cannot be found. From the moment of embarkation upon dirty steamers. crowded with Dutch ladies in bare feet and native dress, to cross a sea that is covered with floating palm trees from the Sumatra River, to that of disembarkation in the lovely tropical forest, dotted houses here and there, which is called the city of Batavia, all is fresh, even to the experienced tra-veller's eye. The system of the Dutch; the after-noon stillness of Buttenzorg Palace, a sort of tropical Versailles; the great rumbling coaches drawn by six pied rats of ponies upon levels, and dragged by eight great tawny buffaloes up the hills; the deafening acreaming of the beetles; the tree-ferns of Sandanglava; the "walking flowers" or pirk orchid insects, feeding on live butterflies, which they will not take dead-all these things tempt the traveller to linger over descriptions of things which cannot be described. The Dutch statistics are eloquent as to the nature of the country which they occupy. Java is not large, but within its limits 300 people every year are eaten to carnivors, 200 by the crocodiles, 100 killed by the rhinoceros, 500 killed by lightning, while 100 die by snakbites, and a varying number by earthquakes and volcanic action. The traveller journeying under Dutch protection along the well-known roads is safe against most of the accidents which destroy the natives of the land; but the hospitalites by which he is sur-rounded, combined with want of knowledge of the language, prevent him from making observations upon the nature of the Dutch rule which are of any worth. It is certain that the Dutch have killed
