The 77th battalion held their annual matches on the ranges of the Victoria rifle club, Hamilton, on the 13th; 5 shots at 200, 400 and 500 yards. Pte. J. Cleaves, of the Waterdown company carried off the first aggregate prize and silver cup with a score of 54 points. In the silver medal competition open to the ten highest aggregates, Pte. Carpenter, of the Stony Creek company, was the winner with a score of 17 points.

Halifax.—A much talked of rifle match between No. 3 battery, H.G.A., and the veteran company, 66th P.L.F., was shot at Bedford range. The artillery team won by 158 points. This match was brought about by some members of the "veterans" claiming that they had the best "average" shooting company in the city, which was promptly questioned by the battery, who had for years proved their proficiency in large teams as well as small, and who hold the silver bugle presented by Gen. Laurie for competition by company teams in the P.R.A. matches, winning it three times in the last four years. The conditions of the match were 20 men aside, 10 rounds at 200 standing, 5 at 300 kneeling, and 5 at 400 prone, militia targets and scoring. As one of the Fusiliers' team failed to turn up, the match was shot with 19 men on each side. Gunner Drysdale, the 20th man of the H.G.A., made 50 points.

The Target.

Beaverton, Ont.—A rifle association has been organized here with Capt. Chas. Patterson as president, F. Madill, vice-president, and L. M. Hayes, secretary-treasurer. It is proposed to arrange a match for Thanksgiving day between the volunteers and civilians to inaugurate the association.

Hamilton.—The twenty-second annual matches of the Victoria rifle club were held here on the 11th and 12th. The attendance was good, the weather delightful, and, with the exception that the wind was at times somewhat erratic, everything passed off in a most satisfactory manner. The scores with the Snider at 600 yards were very unsatisfactory, which, in the opinion of a good many of the old shots, could only be accounted for by the Quebec ammunition not being yet quite up to the mark. Some of it which had been carefully weighed showed a variation of three grains of powder. With this the case it would be impossible to keep all the shots on at the long ranges. Capt. Zealand, in winning the third match, made 8 consecutive "bulls." The shooting at the long ranges in the "any rifle" match was more satisfactory than last year, being shot under the same condition of non-cleaning between shots. The top score made by Mr. A. Pain would be considered a very fair one under the old conditions. The three top scores were made with Remingtons, beating the Metfords, which heretofore have been considered superior under the new conditions. The first aggregate was won with a score of four points more than was made last year.
