DUMPING DUTIES

Mr. Wright:

1. On what imports from Great Britain or other commonwealth countries have dumping duties been applied from January 1, 1947, to date?

2. For what periods of time were such dumping duties applied?

3. What was the rate of such dumping duties and the amount collected in each case?

4. What, if any, was the regular tariff on each classification of goods on which dumping duties were charged?

5. What was the amount of imports into Canada for each classification of goods on which dumping duties were charged (a) for the six months period prior to the application of such dumping duties; (b) for the six months period subsequent to the application of such dumping duties?

6. On what imports from Great Britain or other commonwealth countries has the government announced that they intend to apply dumping duties

at some future date, and (a) what is the rate of such duties; (b) what is the regular tariff on these goods?

Mr. McCann:

1. Section 6 of the customs tariff provides, in respect to imported goods from all sources of a class or kind made or produced in Canada, that if the export or actual selling price to an importer in Canada is less than the fair market value as when sold for home consumption in the country of export, without inclusion of duties and taxes imposed in the country of export, or the value for duty of the goods as determined under the provisions of the Customs Act, there shall, in addition to the duties otherwise established, be levied a special or dumping duty equal to the difference between the selling price and the
