As you can see, we are in the middle of a revolution, a quiet one, and it is a terrific experience. Consequently Quebeckers are perhaps too much preoccupied with and interested in that business and are not enough interested in the federal government. A small part even look at Ottawa with contempt. But if we in Canada now decide, as I am sure this government will, that it is time to introduce the same fascinating challenge into federal politics, we must devote all our interests to building a country totally different from the United States, totally different from the point of view of mentality, culture, education and social security, a country with much more equality between the rich and the poor, with equal opportunity for the son of a farmer and the son of an executive, for the English speaking Canadian and the Canadian who speaks French, for both white and black. If we work seriously toward these goals you can be sure that the Canadians who speak French will put into federal adjourned at 5.02 p.m.
