### FOR MURDER OF TRENDO

Silverstone Testifies That Death Was Result of Wounds.

Before Chief Justice Sir William Mulock, in the criminal assizes yesterday, two Russian Poles, Jan Ziolko and Tomass Cichocki, appeared to answer the charge of murder of Biogoro Trendo. The murder occurred in the rear of Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Tuesday, Dec. 29.

Walter L. Brechell, court stenographer, read the testimony of defendants, taken by him at the inquest, which recited in part that both men had struck the murdered man.

Inspector of Detectives Kennedy, called to the stand, read a pertion of the final confession, and imparted that Ziolko had prompted Cichocki to tell the whole truth.

Several witnesses were called, who identified the purse of the murdered man, which was found in the hame of D. Petro, and also as to the whereabouts of the prisoners and Trendo on the day of the murder. Dr. Silverstone, who had carried on the post-mortem, said that Trendo had died from
