CANADA'S SUPPLIES OFFERED FOR WAR

EPIDEMICS DRIVE GERMAN FORCES OUT OF LEMBERG?

Ravages of Cholera Reported to Be Particularly Deadly —Great Exodus of Galician Refugees to Russian Territory. Special Cable to The Toronto World. PETROGRAD, July 14.—All enemy troops have been withdrawn from Lemberg, owing to the terrible epidemics, of cholera in particular, which are raging there.

TURKEY SEEKING PEACE?

They are stated to be bound for Switzerland, where they will meet representatives of the entente powers and discuss a separate peace.

Big War Orders Received Bigger Ones in Prospect

MUNITIONS OUTPUT CAREFULLY GAUGED Shell Commission Ready to Outline Situation When Thomas Arrives. EXPECT BIG ORDERS Factories That Have Demonstrated Capabilities Will Share Contracts.

By a Staff Reporter. OTTAWA, July 14.—On the arrival in Ottawa of D. A. Thomas, representative of the British Government in Canada on munitions, the shell commission states that it is in a position to give him an accurately compiled statement of the factories which will undertake production of munitions, the parts each is fitted to produce and the capacity of each.

At all times it was stated that the figures printed in these columns were closely approximate, altho apparently considerable doubt regarding that point appeared in certain outside quarters. It was generally overlooked, however, that orders for vast supplies of shell, explosives and general materials were being placed in this country by Great Britain, France and Russia.

TURKS BRING UP RAW TROOPS TO ATTACK ALLIES

Enver Pasha, War Minister, Assumes Command at Dardanelles. ALL EASILY CHECKED Enemy's Infantry Brave, But Greatly Defective in Training.

LONDON, July 15, 2.05 a.m.—The official British press representative with the allied forces in the Dardanelles, in a despatch dated July 7, and reaching London by way of Alexandria, Egypt, July 14, says: "A successful allied advance on the left flank of the Turkish army, seriously causing him to bring up heavy reinforcements, including raw troops, has been followed by a vigorous counter-attack ever since in a vain effort to recover his lost ground."

CANADA RECEIVING HUGE WAR ORDERS

Total to Date Amounts to Nearly Four Hundred Million Dollars. CAREFUL ESTIMATE Shrapnel and Similar War Material Contribute Two-Thirds of Sum.

TERRIFIC FIGHTING UPON ISONZO LINES

Italian Artillerists Bombard Bridge Head at Goritz incessantly. LOSSES ENORMOUS Mountain Slopes and Banks of Rivers Spotted With Bodies.

BUDAPEST, July 14.—Private advices describe the battle of Isonzo as the greatest yet fought on the Italian front, the attack of the Italians being almost incessant. The bridge head of Goritz has suffered greatly from the bombardment of the Italian artillerists, who seem resolute to carry this position at whatever cost in order to develop an offensive in the upper region on the east side of the River Isonzo.

Tightening the Strangle Hold!

The war grows brighter for the allies all-around. England has wakened up at last; and while there may be petty dissensions in parliament and in the press the nation as a nation is united. The magnificent response to the war loan shows how the people speak by their pockets; and without words the contribution is an eloquent one.

Public opinion in the United States is more and more with the allies and against the Germans, and President Wilson will, in all probability, send a rather sharp and short reply to the attempt of the German minister of foreign affairs to side-step the issue that was put to him in the last message of the president. No answer was made to the stand taken by the United States against the murder of their citizens, non-combatants traveling about their ordinary business on ordinary ships of commerce.

MANTOBA CONSERVATIVES BENT ON 'HOUSE-CLEANING'

New Manitoba Leader? Convention Pledges Itself to Abolition of Spoils System, and to Other Reforms—Attitude of Lieutenant-Governor Cameron Denounced as Unconstitutional.

WINNIPEG, July 14.—Delegates to the convention of the Conservative Association of Manitoba at this afternoon's session listened and cheered when George H. Bradbury, M.P. for Selkirk criticized what he termed "the unconstitutional acts of the lieutenant-governor of the province."

SIR ROBERT L. BORDEN AT CABINET MEETING

Imperial Government Takes Canada's Premier in Consultation on War. LONDON, July 14.—Sir Robert L. Borden, Canadian premier, attended today's meeting of the cabinet. This is in line with the policy announced by the British Government, of consulting the dominion governments on the steps being taken to prosecute the war, and the promise that the dominions would be heard on all matters concerning the empire.

FRENCH RETAKE GROUND LOST IN ARGONNE WOOD

Fiery Counter Offensive Gives Them Footing in German First Line Trenches. DARING AERIAL RAID Twenty Allied Aeroplanes Bombard Libercourt Railway Station in Flanders.

LONDON, July 14.—Not only have the French troops in the Argonne forest regained the trenches temporarily occupied in a big offensive by the army of the German Crown Prince, but they have pushed their lines forward and taken some places having a foothold in the trenches of the enemy. The French army directed its counter-offensive from the district lying west of the road between Binerville and Vienne-le-Chateau and extended their onset as far as Marie Theres. The German gains yesterday at these points were at no places more than a quarter of a mile in depth.

Brilliant Raid on Station

Another feature of the day's operations was a brilliant aerial raid on the Libercourt station, a military bifurcation between Douai and Lille, by a squadron of 29 allied aeroplanes, which dropped 24 shells of 30 millimetres and 14 shells of 150 millimetres on the structure, while other aeroplanes furnished with cannon, and equipped in aerial development, bombarded a train which had come to a stop between two stations, and also forced a German aeroplane which they encountered, to drop to the ground.

Attack on British Troops

The Germans also attempted in the night to recapture the trenches taken by the British troops on the canal north of Ypres the other day, but they were easily repulsed. This is the only fighting reported on the British front today.

ONE PER CENT. DISCOUNT ON CANADIAN CURRENCY

Banks at Niagara Falls, New York, Adopted This Procedure Yesterday. Special to The Toronto World. NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., July 14.—All the banks in Niagara Falls have united in making the following statement: "Owing to the increased premium rate charged by the Canadian banks for New York exchange, the only medium by which we can convert Canadian currency into the money of the United States, we are compelled to discount Canadian currency and items 1 per cent. on and after this date."
