On the 17th of July we came to an Indian town, the inhabitants of which told Mr. Parmentiers, that at a fmall diffance from us there was a large fhip, in a place where no fuch thing had ever been feen before; upon which, we inftantly made the beft of our way for this fhip; but when we came to her, we found in her only a man pretty well in years, who was the Captain, and another in the prime of his youth, the owner and crew being gone a trading.

In the mechanical parts of the mathematicks I never have met with the mafter's equal; my fecond mate and my gunner were *Englifhmen*, and thorough feamen; they had both been made prifoners at *Campeachy*, as likewife had been the Captain's fon; they reported to me that the fhip came from *Bof*ton, the chief town of *New England*.

On the 30th of July the owner of the ship and all the fhip's company came on board of me: the Captain of the ship, whose name was Shapely, informing me, that the owner of his thip was a very worthy man, and major-general of Mattechufets, the greatest colony in all New England. I treated him as a perfon to whom fome regard was due; fignifying to him, that though my orders were to make prize of all whom I should meet with, coming in fearch of a north-weft or weft paffage into the South fea, I was willing to look upon them only as merchants trading with the natives, for fkins and furrs; and he, as an acknowledgement of this indulgence, made me a prefent of provisions, doubtless on a supposition that I wanted them; which gratitude I returned with a diamond ring, but it was with great difficulty I could prevail on this gentleman to accept of it.
