duce. Anxious, therefore, to explain what had been misinterpreted or misrepresented, (as indeed might well be expected, from the publication of Lord C.'s letter of the 20th of October, without being accompanied by my answer to it) I had proposed taking an opportunity, in the Houfe of Commons, of faying a few words on fuch parts of my conduct as feemed not to be fufficiently understood : and I flatter myfelf I should have been able to make it appear, that I acted . up to the utmost of my powers, from the beginning to the end of my command; and that none of the misfortunes of the very unfortunate campaign of 1781 can, with the finalleft degree of juflice, be imputed to me.

But I arrived here fo late in the feffion, that I was advifed to defer it; and it was judged that the gracious reception I had just met with from my Sovereign rendered an immediate explanation unneceffary. I was not,
