

have been the principal foundation for the belief that 1494 was the date of the important discovery in question. The inscription numbered 8 is as follows:—

*“De Terra Nova quoniam vulgus Bacallios appellant.”*

“Terram hanc olim nobis clausam aperuit Johannes Cabotus Venetus, nec non Sebastianus Cabotus eius filius, anno ab orbe redempto 1494, die vero 21 Iunii, hora 5, sub dilucole, quam quippe que solemni die festo Divi Johannis aperta fuit. Huius terrae incole pellibus animalium inobumuntur. Areu in bello sagittis, spiculis, clavis ligneis & fundis vtuntur, sterilis inaulta, tellus est, leonibus, ursis albis, proceris, cornis, piscibus immuneris, lupis & salmonibus, & ingentibus soleis vnius vlnie longitudine, aliisque piscium dimeris abundat generibus. Horum autem maxima perilesque fusco colore, alioque dimerte volueres.”

Which I translate thus:—

“John Cahot, a Venetian, with his son Sebastian Cabot, discovered this land, which was formerly hidden from us, on the 24th June 1494 [1594 is an evident printer's error], at 5 o'clock in the morning; to which land they gave the name of ‘Prima Vista,’ and to a certain large island near to it the name of St. John’s Island, because it was discovered on the festival of St. John. The inhabitants of this land are clad in skins of animals. In battle they use a bow and arrows, darts, wooden clubs, and slings. The country is barren and uncultivated. It abounds with lions, white bears, tall stags, fish in countless numbers, wolves, salmon, huge soles an ell long, and various other kinds of fish. But those are in the greatest abundance which the common people call Bacallios. To these are to be added hawks of a black colour like crows, eagles, partridges of a dark colour, and a variety of other birds.”

That portion of the inscription numbered 17, which affects our question, is as follows:—

*“Inscriptio sec Titulus auctoris.”*

“Sebastianus Cabotus Dux & Archigubernius saeculae Cesareae maiestatis, domini Caroli Imperatoris, huius nominis quinti, & regis Hispaniae, summam mihi manum imposuit, & ad formam hanc protrahens, planam figuram me delineauit, anno ab orbe redempto, nativitate Domini nostri Jesu Christi 1549, qui me iuxta graduum latitudinem ac longitudinem, ventorum situm, tam docte, tam fideliter, navigatorie chartae instar, descripsit, Geographi Ptolomei autoritatem, peritiorumq; Lusitanorum fidem secutus, nec non ex vsu atque industria longe nauigationis, integerrimi viri Joannis Caboti, natione Veneti, atque Sebastiani astrorum periti, nauigandi arte omnium doctissimi eius filii, auctorisq; mei, qui aliquotam orbis partem diu nostratis clausam aperuerunt. . . . At hec Sebastianus Cabotus, meus autor, occidentalem Oceanum adnauigans, ad aquor quoddam deuenit, & plagam vbi quarta parte Septentrionum iuxta cœcum ventura acus navigatorie illum illi rectissimè Arcum ostenderet. Quibus de causis & rationibus & tutissimâ nauigandi
