

In all places where steps, or cellar doors advance three feet or more into the streets, the proprietors of these steps and cellar doors shall pave with stone two feet in breadth from them farther out into the street; whosoever does not strictly comply with this regulation shall forfeit forty shillings.

For every week that this work shall be left undone after the first of August the offender shall pay ten shillings.

XXI. No person under any pretence whatsoever shall presume to ride on horse-back on any foot-path in town, or shall suffer the wheels of his cart or carriage to pass over a foot-path under the penalty of five shillings for every offence.

XXII. Every tavern-keeper, inn-keeper and keeper of a coffee-house shall on the first day of December next put up a lamp at his or her door out-side, so as to give light in the street from dusk until twelve o'clock at night (excepting moon light) under a penalty of five shillings for every night he or she shall neglect or refuse to comply with this article.

XXIII. Any person who shall wilfully break a lamp in the street shall pay a fine of forty shillings.

XXIV. No mason or other person shall open a quarry within the walls of Quebec, for the purpose of obtaining stones for building without leave from the Commissioners of the Peace in their weekly Court, under the penalty of forty shillings.

XXV. All persons bringing provisions, provender, fire-wood or any thing in a sleigh, for the supply of Quebec, shall carry a hoe and a shovel that he may use them in levelling cahoes at any distance within three leagues of the town, under a penalty of five shillings.

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
