Horse Market Firm Heavy Draughts Cause Brisk Bidding

The market was fair for the week end at Maher's exchange yesterday. The western buyers were tilling their cars with choice horses for the west, and when heavy draughts were on the floor the bidding was spirited. The demand for horses is getting better. The exchange was nearly all sold out of stock, and over 300 head will arrive of fresh country stock for next sale.

A. R. Speers is back from Winnipeg and purchased a car of horses. A. A. O'Connor, Aurora, picked up a gelding rather cheap. G. W. Hepton of Shelburne paid \$200 for a bay mare, and also purchased a good looking black mare at a fair figure. E. Jones and W. H. Vansickle each got a good city worker. James Whitney bought a stylish bay gelding for \$225. W. J. Cairns of Mayfield purchased a handsome black team of geldings for \$415. A. A. Conn got a good city worker rather cheap, and W. J. Cook of Eborale a bay gelding for \$175. T. A. Crow purchased a good looking gray mare with considerable style, and Morris Shapere a couple of good heavy workers. J. Sidney got a city worker for \$250, and Wm. McCullum one for \$35. Chas. Mason purchased a car of mares for western market.

H. W. and J. G. Weatherly of Roathern, Sask. bought another carload of horses and completed their consignment for the west. They secured in all 35 horses, the majority showing considerable class. One pair of mares cost them \$310. Mr. Maher reported the market firm. Heavy draught horses, weighing 1600 to 1800 lbs., \$240 to \$270; heavy draughts, 1200 to 1400 lbs., \$200 to \$230; serviceable sound, \$135 to \$165; city workers, \$55 to \$75.

The management of the exchange are very well pleased with the sale, and the healthy condition of the market.

Speaks for Young Torontonians

Ernie Knott, manager of the expanded Young Toronto Lacrosse Club writes to the papers. He states that he would just like to acquaint the public with the fact that this new Ontario Lacrosse Association is not composed of outcasts, rebels or even sore losers, as has been intimated. On the other hand, it is composed of energetic players who are not at all satisfied with the lax methods of the C.L.A. in dealing with the amateur question. He continues:

"I cannot speak personally for the other clubs, but I can speak for the Young Torontonians, and I think I am right when I say that the Young Torontonians are not outcasts from the C.L.A., simply because Secretary Hall notified them that such is the decision of President Eby. There is a constitution which is supposed to control the C.L.A., by which those in authority are to control their decisions and their constitution which is supposed to be amended before the Young Torontonians can be termed 'Outcasts,' and of course such a thing cannot happen before the annual convention of that body on Good Friday."

"In the meantime there will be the meeting of the Ontario Lacrosse Association, which will look after the clubs who have respect for their amateur standing and which will be satisfied to be controlled by strict rules, properly applied governing this vital factor in sport."
