EXTRAVAGANCE UNDER THE LIBERAL ADMINISTRATION.

One of the arguments cited by the Liberal leaders and newspapers in favor of a change of Government is based on the extravagance of the Conservative Government. The public debt of Canada is pointed at with the finger of alarm, and the Conservative Government is charged with reckless extravagance in regard to the increase from 1872 to 1895 of the public debt. It is claimed that the Reform party is composed of men who are more virtuous and will exercise greater economy than the Ministers who now have charge of the affairs of the country. A pretty good criterion of what the Liberals would do if they were returned to power may be had from considering what they have done when they were in power. The public debt in 1872-73 was \$9,848,461. This was the debt at the time the Liberals under Alex. Mackenzie came into power. Five years later, when the Liberal Government was defeated, the debt had risen to \$10,382,089, an increase of \$533,628, or over 40 per cent. With this period of five years under a Liberal Government let us compare the last five years of the Conservative regime. The total debt in 1890 was \$27,809,030. In 1895 it was \$33,074,927. In the five years there was an increase of \$5,265,897, or somewhat less than 6 per cent. In contrast with the Liberal Government, with a loaded rifle on the public chest, could not keep down expenditure any more successfully than he did, is it likely that the present Liberal leaders would be as successful in this direction? It is better to judge by what they have done than by what they promise to do.

Again, let us compare the increase in expenditure during the five years of Liberal Government with the increase during the five years of Conservative Government. The total expenditure for the year immediately previous to the Liberal party's coming into power was \$19,746,471. The total expenditure during the last year of the Liberal Administration was \$23,088,151. This increase was \$3,341,680, or about 17 per cent. The figures for the Conservative Government for the years 1890 and 1895 were \$36,548,568 and \$38,122,065, respectively. The increase was \$1,573,497, or less than 4 per cent. Instead of proving that the Liberals would manage the affairs of the country more economically than the Conservatives have done, these figures show that they might expect an enormous increase, both in the public debt and in the annual expenditure, if the Liberals should unfortunately be returned to power.

THE LIBERAL PARTY'S SUPERANNUATION RECORD.

No wonder the public debt is large. Below are a few of the superannuation charges added on the country by the Mackenzie Government. Up to June 30, 1895, the gentlemen mentioned had drawn the sums opposite their respective names:

John Langton, Auditor-General, \$42,558
R. A. Meredith, Deputy Minister of Interior, 42,000
George Fisher, Deputy Minister of Militia, 29,138
J. B. Macdonald, Minister of Justice, 33,071
A. Woodgate, Inspector Post-office, 31,176
Of the civil servants superannuated during the Liberal regime from 1873 to 1878, twenty-nine were alive in 1894-95, and four have died since. The total amount paid these 33 employees of the Government to date aggregated the enormous sum of \$315,753. Up to June 30, 1895, the civil servants superannuated by the Mackenzie Administration in the five short years it lasted, had drawn from the superannuation fund the sum of \$960,002. As the total expenditure for the superannuation up to that date had been \$4,039,350, the Liberals for their five years had incurred very nearly a quarter of the outlay, an enormous overproportion from any point of view. And in the fiscal year 1894-95, 33 civil servants, superannuated by the Liberals, were still on the list and drew \$15,170.

The fact that so many of these superannuated officials are still alive, 18 years after they left the employ of the Government, is rather strong evidence that the Mackenzie Government was not as economical and virtuous as the Grits would have us believe. Not only are many of these superannuated officials still alive, but several of them occupy lucrative positions in the Government. Mr. E. A. Meredith, for instance, is connected with one of our large financial institutions in this city, and is no doubt handsomely paid for his valuable services. During no subsequent period of equal duration has the superannuation fund been burdened with such enormous charges as it was during the administration of Mr. Mackenzie and Sir Richard Cartwright.

The annual general meeting of the Dominion Bank was held at the Banking House of the Institution, Toronto, on Wednesday, May 27th, 1896. Among those present were: Mr. James Austin, President; Mr. R. D. Gamble, Secretary; Mr. C. M. Mason, William Ince, Col. Smith, William Ramsay, W. G. Cassels, E. Leadley, M. Boulton, Aaron Ross, B. B. Oiler, William Hendrie, Dr. Smith, John Stewart, R. S. Cassels, Walter S. Lee, J. L. Campbell, W. R. Brock, S. Nordheimer, James Robertson, R. D. Gamble, and others.

It was moved by Sir Frank Smith, seconded by Mr. E. Leadley, that Mr. James Austin do take the chair. Col. Mason moved, seconded by R. S. Cassels, and resolved, "That Mr. R. D. Gamble do act as secretary." Messrs. R. S. Cassels and Walter S. Lee were appointed scrutineers. The secretary read the report of the directors to the shareholders, and submitted the annual statement of the affairs of the bank, which is as follows: To the Shareholders: The Directors beg to present the following statement of the result of the business of the Bank for the year ending 30th April, 1896:

Balance of profit and loss account: Dividend 3 per cent., paid last August, 1895, \$45,000.00; Dividend 3 per cent., paid last November, 1895, 45,000.00; Dividend 3 per cent., payable May 28, 1896, 45,000.00; Dividend 3 per cent., 45,000.00; Total, 180,000.00. Balance of Profit and Loss carried forward, \$26,702.43. Toronto, May 8, 1896.
