

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

New York, Oct. 30.—Michael Hatal, the magician, known as "the bullet catcher," who was acidentally shot on Saturday night while giving an exhibition at an East Side ball at 197 East Fourth-street, died at 4.30 'Clock yesterday 'afternoon' in Bellevue Hospital.
