An important move was made when it was decided to establish districts, for the present three in number—western. northern and eastern. In each district preliminary meetings will be held, at which the clubs in that district will compete. The winners of first and second places in the different events at these divisional regattas will be eligible to participate in the main regatta, at which the events deciding the Canadian championships will be padded. The clubs in the different divisions are as follows: Western—Brockville Kowing Club, Bohemians and Y.M.C.A. of the same town and Smith's Falls.

Northern—Britannias, Ottawas and Rideaus of Ottawa and Carleton Place.

Eastern—Grand Trunks of Montreal. St. Lamberts, Longueuil, Lachine, St. John's, St. Stephen's.





INE GENERAL IS RETIRED

Count Keller Supersedes General Zassalitch and Rumored Dissatisfaction is True.

St. Petersburg, May 17.-(11.31 p.m.)-It is announced to-night Lieutenant-General Zassalitch been relieved of the command of the second Siberian army division and that Lieut.-Gen. Count Keller, ormer governor of Ekaterinoslav, has been appointed to succeed him. Since the battle of the Yalu it has

een predicted that Gen. Zassalitch would not long retain his command, but here has been no disposition to act hastily. The emperor's advisers could carry out the plan of operations which had been previously determined upon, he had displayed a stubborn resistance which showed to the enemy and to the world that the Russians had not lost the courageous spirit of past genera-

What will become of Zassalitch what will become of Zassanta whether he will remain in the far east or be assigned to a less important region cannot be learned to-night, but it is emphatically stated that there is no intention of the state of th intention to disgrace him, and that if he returns from the far east it will be on sick leave and at his own request.

Lieut.-Gen. Count Keller recently resigned the governorship of Ekaterinoslav, in order to go to the front. He is a far abler soldier than an administrator, and is younger than Gen. Zasalitch, being only 54. He participated in three campaigns during the Turkish war. In 1887 he commanded the imperial Rifle Regiment, and later was director of the corps of imperial pages, by which he was thrown into frequent contact with the members of the imcontact with the members of the im-perial family, with whom he is popu-lar. He is considered to be a distinguished strategist and the posses of cool judgment.
