A single base hit in the first and one in the third were all that were made until the ninth, when Babbitt got a scratch hit, and then Jones made a long high fly to left. Schall got under it, but as he caught the ball he ran into a post and Jones got credit for a three-base hit instead of an out. This gave one run. The other was made in the sixth, when Hagerty threw the ball over the first baseman's head and allowed Howell to make the whole circuit of the bases. Hamilton landed heavily on Crow, and he was not very steady. CANADIANS AT HENLEY. The Canadian scullers have started training at Henley, England. Goldmann went over half the course in 4 minutes and 11 seconds. The Canadian eight did the same distance in 3 minutes and 32 seconds. During the day the Canadians did some fast work.

Their eight rowed over the full course in 7 minutes and 1 second, at an average stroke of 36, which is reckoned a good performance, the record being 6 minutes and 51 seconds. The Canadian four did the course in 3 minutes and 11 seconds, to the astonishment of all spectators.

LAST DAY OF LONDON'S RACES

Successful Meet at Queen's Park Brought to a Close.

Dick French in Evidence—He Seems to Improve With Age—Jockey Lawrence Fined \$10.

The race meet at Queen's Park was brought to a close yesterday afternoon after four days' good racing. From the view point of the spectators the meet was an unqualified success. The sport was excellent. Directors of the association looking at the meeting in another light say it was not such a great success, financially. The attendance was too small. Yet they hope to break even, at least, and expenses have been heavy.

The attendance yesterday afternoon was particularly light, though the day was an ideal one, and the programme promising. Unfortunately the association had not arranged for the running event in time to make it generally known beforehand. In some respects the day's races were the most interesting of the meet. In the second and third events particularly there were "sensational features." Old Dick French got into fast company in the 2:20 trot and pace, and although he has been a familiar figure on Canadian tracks, winter and summer, for the past 10 or 12 years, many old turfmen say he never did better than yesterday. "Look at those knees," they like him. He improves with age, and at old boys' were some of the expressions that could be heard on every side when the well-known chestnut was getting over the course. He broke two or three times, an unusual thing for him, but he traveled fast.

Black Joe, the winner of the 2:30 trot and 2:35 pace, is a new comer, picked up at Grand's sale last winter, for \$150, it is said. He is a great colt, and won handsily.

Yellow Jacket took the place of the consolation race previously announced had six starters. Caspar was favorite for the first heat, and without much trouble. For the second heat Yellow Jacket was considered a moral, and was heavily backed. She was ridden by A. Lawrence, who kept her in the lead until the stretch was reached. Then Dogma, with Jamieson up, gained rapidly, and was soon even with the little chestnut mare. Lawrence crowded close to Dogma as the horses neared the wire, and when in front of the judges' stand caught hold of Jockey Jamieson, and in such a manner pulled Yellow Jacket forward. F. Sage, owner of Yellow Jacket, at once protested to the judges against the conduct of his jockey.

A deliberate foul, claiming to have the mare set back to second place. The judges fined Lawrence \$10 and exonerated Mr. Sage from any blame in the matter. Yellow Jacket carried 112 pounds. Summaries:

CHAPTER OF CASUALTIES

Matches Caused the Death of a Little Girl in Toronto.

Open Verdict in the Supposed Suicide Case at Galt—Bay Drowned While Bathing.

PLAYED WITH MATCHES. Quebec, June 24.—An 8-year-old girl named Cote, while playing with matches, was burned to death Thursday.

Toronto, June 24.—Pearl Adelaide, the 3½-year-old daughter of Philip Smith Dalhousie street, died from a burn. Last Saturday morning the little girl was playing with some matches in the back yard. Her clothing caught fire and her legs were badly burned. Pearl died Thursday morning.

DIED FROM POISONING.

Galt, June 24.—John W. Neff, a retired farmer, was found dead in bed at his home on Wednesday, June 7. It was at first thought that death had resulted from natural causes, but an investigation gave reason to believe that it was due to poisoning. The coroner's inquest was concluded Wednesday night, when the following verdict was returned: "In the opinion of the jury, fully proven that death resulted from carbolic acid poisoning, but whether the acid was taken with suicidal intent, or administered by another person, the evidence was not sufficient to determine."

DROWNED WHILE BATHING.

Ottawa, June 24.—The 8-year-old son of J. B. Loughran, confectioner, Dalhousie street, was drowned in the Rideau River, while bathing on Thursday.

CUT HER HUSBAND'S THROAT.

New York, June 24.—Grace Ramsey, 27 years of age, cut the throat of her husband, Harvey J. Ramsey, 50 years old, yesterday morning, while the man was asleep in bed in their apartments at the Garden Hotel on Madison avenue. The woman was arrested. Ramsey was removed to Bellevue Hospital. He is a ticket seller at Madison Square Garden. He cannot recover. When arrested, Mrs. Ramsey gave as the reason for her terrible deed, that her husband snored.

TOOK POISON BY MISTAKE.

Hamilton, June 24.—Mr. Dennis Buckley, aged 74, one of the oldest residents of the north end of the city, and a man who had the respect of every citizen, died at his home, 253 John street north, on Thursday. He took a dose of carbolic acid by mistake, thinking he was taking medicine. About a year ago and his wife celebrated their golden wedding.
