

Six Ways To Make Unusual Fillings For Cakes.

Six Ways To Make Unusual Fillings For Cakes.

The plainest one-egg cake can be made an elaborate company dessert by the addition of some unusual filling. Use either two or more layers, or if some stale sponge cake is on hand try the following:

Scoop out the centre of the cake, leaving a wall about one inch thick, into which the filling may be poured. Then mix the crumbs with the filling and place in the hollowed cake.

Apple Filling.

3 baked apples.

1 white of egg.

1 cup of powdered sugar.

Press the apples through a sleve.

Beet the white of egg until stiff. Add

240 deg. F., or until a soft ball can be formed when tested in cold water. Remove from the fire, add the nut meats, and beat until smooth and creamy.

Stirring frequently, until it proper consistency.

Date and Fig Filling. Mocha Filling. 2 tablespoonfuls of hot, black coffee. 1 tablespoonful of butter. 2 tablespoonfuls of cocoa.

½ teaspoonful of vanilla.
1 cupful of powdered sugar.
Mix together the coffee, butter, cocoa and vanilla. Add sufficient sugar for mixture to spread without running. Orange Filling.

Date and Fig Filling.

1 cupful of figs.

1 cupful of dates.
Juice of ½ lemon.

½ cupful of sugar.

½ cupful of boiling water. Wash, dry and chop the figs. Wa dry, stone and chop the dates. Mix fruit with the sugar, water and lem juice, and cook over hot water until gets thick enough to spread.

Coffee Cream Filling. 1/2 cupful strong coffee.
1 cupful of milk.

Orange Filling.

½ cupful of sugar.

3 tablespoonfuls of flour.
Grated rind of ½ orange.
½ cupful of orange juice.
½ cupful of orange juice.
1 beaten egg.
1 teaspoonful of butter.
In the top of a double boller mix the sugar, flour and rind of orange. Add to milk and cook over water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Cook 15 minutes.
Cook ever hot water for 12 minutes, flavor before spreading.
