QUALIFIED TEACHERS MUST BE DEMANDED. Deputy Minister of Education Tells of Efforts to Appoint Unqualified Candidates.

"The department has constantly been asked to wink at the appointment of unqualified teachers," said A. H. M. Colquhoun, L.L.D., deputy minister of education, to the Ontario Educational Association at their closing meeting in convocation hall last night.

"It is reasonable that a trustee should act differently from that which he would act in his private business," said Colquhoun, who would say if, when he needed a bookkeeper, he were asked to take a carpenter, merely on the grounds of his general intelligence, his willingness and his handsomeness of face? The old system has passed on to the next generation, using the teaching profession as a stepping stone to other walks of life.

The education no difficulty has been found greater than that of eliciting financial support, but I have been struck by nothing more in recent years than the readiness of the public to respond to reasonable appeals honestly made. The cost of education in the province has increased from \$1,000,000, nearly \$3,000,000 of this being paid by the local authorities. This is bound to increase.
