

BELMONT STAKES EASY FOR KEENE'S "SWEEP."

Semprotus Wins National Stallion Stakes—Ross Fenton in Jumps.

BELMONT Park, May 30.—Before a crowd of 20,000 persons James R. Keene's Sweep, at 11 to 20 in the betting, easily won the \$10,000 Belmont Stakes, one mile and three furlongs, at Belmont Park today. The victory of Sweep was little more than a gallop and at no stage of the journey was he fully extended. Sweep had as an opponent Duke of Ormonde and he so far overwhelmingly outclassed his competitor that he was held at 1 to 20 while \$ to 1 was laid against Duke of Ormonde.

The National Stallion Stakes resulted in a victory for the 5 to 1 shot, Semprotus, who defeated a high-class field of 3-year-olds. He took the lead early and won by six lengths.

The Grand National Steeplechase resulted in a fine race, with Ross Fenton being returned the winner by half a length over Kara, 15 to 1.

McFarland and Welch Draw.

LONDON, May 30.—Pokey McFarland of Chicago and Freddie Welch, the British lightweight champion, fought a 20-round draw to-night before the National Sporting Club. The fight was for a purse of \$800 and a side bet of \$100.

McFarland had much the better of the bout. He led all the way, knocking his opponent against the ropes repeatedly and forcing the fighting in every round.

Delaney for the Johnson Camp. SAN FRANCISCO, May 30.—The latest announcement from Jack Johnson's camp is that negotiations for the supervisory services of the veteran trainer, Billy Delaney, have been concluded, and that he and Al Kaufman will be installed in Johnson's quarters to-morrow or Wednesday.

Johnson says that Delaney has agreed to oversee his training, along with the job of managing Kaufman, and that from now on until the date of the big fight Delaney will have the say regarding his preparations for his meeting with Jeffries.

Kaufman, according to Johnson, will continue training for his coming fight with Sam Langford at Johnson's place, and he and the negro champion will aid each other in boxing bouts. Both Delaney and Kaufman are now at Harbin, Spruce, but are expected to return to San Francisco to-morrow.

Johnson is enthusiastic over his success. He believes that the veteran's advice will be of vast benefit to him.

Cornell Crew Beat Harvard. BOSTON, Mass., May 30.—Sixteen strong-armed Cornell oarsmen swept the Charles River to-day, the variety defeating Harvard in a beautiful race by a full length, while the freshmen completely outclassed the Crimson eight, winning by six lengths.

Cornell's short, choppy stroke proved superior to Harvard's long, rhythmic swing. The Harvard oarsmen seemed to have plenty of power, but for some reason Stroke Cutler was content with the results at the first mile, and also this held Cornell for the first mile in rough waters. In the last half of the race Cornell's swift paddles and numerous upstrokes drove their shells leading away and there was a bit of open water between the boats as they darted across the line.

It was a poor day for good oarsmanship, as the Charles River was for several hours this afternoon beaten into foam by a stiff, cold northeaster. Towards night conditions moderated, and shortly after 5 o'clock the varsity race was started in pretty rough water.

The freshmen race was, however, rowed in slightly smoother water than the varsity, which partly accounts for the faster time.
