IN WRECK ON I. C. R.

Number of Others Were Injured

in Collision of Freight

Cars.

QUEBEC, March 22.—Four men are dead and a number of others are injured following a head-on collision at Val Brabant on the I.C.R., in the County of Rimouski.

The two trains that collided were freight trains. One was at a standstill on the main line.

The dead are: A. Chalmers of Campbell and St. Amant, St. Moine, who was in charge of a carload of horses, five of which were killed, and A. Thibadeau of Sayabes, who was with St. Amant.

JAP STEAMER GIVEN UP.

LONDON, March 22.—The Japanese steamship Kokoku Maru, long overdue, has virtually been given up as lost. She was posted as missing at Lloyd's today. She left Portland Ore., on Nov. 8, with a cargo of wheat for the United Kingdom, and was last reported as leaving Singapore on Dec. 20.

CORNWALLIS WEST BANKRUPT.

LONDON, March 22.—George Cornwallis West, intimate friend of the late King Edward, has gone "broke" on account of the war. In bankruptcy court today he gave his liabilities as \$79,440 and his assets as \$48,400.

HAVANA, Cuba, March 22.—The Australian cruiser Sydney arrived here today, supposedly for purpose of obtaining coal and provisions.

She will sail within the prescribed 24 hours. Whence she came or whither she is going is unknown.

BACK VON TIRPITZ.

"The overwhelming majority of our people feel themselves therein at one with the creator and organizer of our navy. Altho the people repose unshakable trust in the supreme command, apprehensions are widespread of the retirement of the grand admiral is connected with his attitude on this question, and statements of newspapers whose connection with governmental circles is known to have confirmed this interpretation.

"It is our conviction that it is an urgent demand of the hour that ground for these apprehensions be first removed. The resolutions before the Reichstag offer a suitable occasion for these resolutions and reject, as constitutionally ungrounded, the criticism prematurely meted out in respect to them by officially inspired organs. We voice the inmost feelings and dearest wishes of wide circles of the German people when we give expression to the hope that the leaders of the empire will give these resolutions the consideration which will do justice to their patriotic spirit and promise the fulfillment of their patriotic aims.

"We believe that in these days of earnest endeavor it is our duty to the nation and fatherland, imperiously demanded of us by the national conscience, to speak out these things openly."

Campaign Against Government.

AMSTERDAM, Holland, March 22.—(V.L.) London.—The Tagblatt of Berlin protests indignantly against what it terms the anti-governmental campaign to obtain signatures to petitions and otherwise to create a tremendous demonstration in favor of intensified submarine warfare.

Tagblatt asserts writers in restaurants and cafes go from table to table in an effort to obtain signatures to the petitions.

PEACE MOVE REPORT.

State Department at Washington Puts Quiet on New Rumor.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—The state department today made the following statement: The German Government had intimated that it desired this government act as mediator in peace negotiations or had in any way suggested, formally or informally, that this government should take the matter with the other powers, is absolutely without foundation.
