CANADIANS MINED WAY FOR FAMOUS VICTORY

Craters Mark Spot Where Dominion Engineers Tunneled Avenues to Lead to Undoing of Strongest German Defences.

Ottawa, Aug. 20.—The following article on the work of the Canadian tunneling companies in France, written by Major Roland Hill, is issued by the militia department:

War Correspondents' Headquarters in France—The major from British Columbia showed me a crumpled, twisted mixture of earth and concrete, wrecked entanglements, parts of splintered facings and dugout—under which hundreds of Hun were buried—and turned his professional eye to the depth of the crater in the centre.

"It should have been much deeper," he said. "I wanted them to put another five thousand pounds of ammonal down there, but they said it was enough."

"They were the staff of explosive experts who think, perhaps eat, drink and sleep, on plans of explosively indigestible destruction of the German line. On the right was the shattered rubble of brick that had been Wytchaehe, from which the Huns once could see all over the line from this section. Canadians knew it to their cost in the spring of 1916.

ALTON KNITTING MILLS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Three-storey Stone Structure and Valuable Machinery is Mass of Ruins.
