EVERY CHILD BORN A LEGITIMATE ONE

F. N. Stapleton Recommends Radical Changes in Social Legislation.

F. N. Stapleton of the Neighborhood orkers' Association delivered an in-Workers' Association delivered an interesting address on the subject of "What Can Be Accomplished by Social Legislation" before a large number of people in Foresters' Hall, College street, yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Stapleton, who has spent a great deal of time in investigating conditions among the poor in connection with the work of the association, made an analysis of the immediate made an analysis of the immediate causes of poverty. These, he said, are low wages, unemployment, physical defects, desertion, character defects, old age and widowhood. A considerable portion of the population, he said, are not able to accumulate a reserve fund to meet such conditions when they arise, and this section is chiefly composed of unskilled and unorganized workers. Their money is exhausted as it is earned, and they are immediately impoverished when are immediately impoverished when sickness, unemployment or other misfortunes fall upon them.

To combat these conditions, the speaker prescribed a readjustment of of the period of compulsory school attendance, development of vocational guidance and technical education. This, he said, would produce more

This, he said, would produce more capable citizens who would earn more and set raide money for future needs.

Readjustment Recommended.

He also recommended a readjustment in the industrial field in wages, hours, and control in industry and better social legislation, as an example of which he quoted the workmen's compensation act, dealing with its adventered and the great disadvantered. vantages and the great disadvantage the workers were under before its en-actment. He advocated a similar act as a protection against sickness, unemployment and widowhood, and em-phasized the necessity of allowances for widowed mothers, invalid insurnce, and their value as a force

ance, and their value as a force against poverty.

Later the speaker dealt with the illegitimate child problem and the status of the legitimate child in Ontario. He advocated changes in the law and recommended that the state be the legal guardian of the child, at the same time assuming the responsibility of securing support and supervising adoption; that subsequent marriage of the parents should automatically legitimatize the child; that the child should be entitled to the name of the father; that the child; that the child should be entitled to the name of the father; that the parents should be required to support the child as if it were legitimate, or that the child should have the full right of inheritance, even if the father is married and has a family; that if several men are implicated the financial responsibility should be shared by each, and that the expenses of child birth should be borne by them.

The speaker's remarks were well received, and the meeting showed a great interest in the problems at the discussion which followed the address.
