INTREPID EXPLORERS
BREAK RIVER RECORDS

**John E. Moore and Party Reached Belyea's Yesterday—Tug
Kitchen Carried The Explorers Farther Up River Than
The Point Reached in 1892**

"H. M. S. Lord Kitchen, provisioned
at this point on Jan. 24th, 1906. On board

The above record, inscribed in the re-
gister at Belyea's, near Public Landing
across from the R. K. Y. Club summer
residence at Carter's Point, tells the
"farthest north" story of winter naviga-
tion on the St. John river.

The expedition, provisioned for six
hours, left North Wharf shortly after 1
o'clock yesterday afternoon and boldly pro-
ceeded through the falls and up the river.
A little field ice was encountered off
Westfield, and what a man who had once
read a book on Arctic exploration said
was "Jolly" was seen near Walter's
Landing.

At Carter's Point the wall of ice ex-
tended clear across the river, but the
Lord Kitchen ploughed her way through it
for a quarter of a mile or so, until at
a thickness of about five inches it began
to resist her attack.

By this time she had proceeded about
a hundred yards farther than any previ-
ous midwinter expedition had been able
to go, which was glory enough for even
the distinguished party of daring naviga-
tors on her decks yesterday.

The ship was rammed several lengths
into the ice, jammed hard against it, and
a ladder put over the side. The party
disembarked and walked to the shore.
They went to the shore of Mr. Belyea's
and made a number of important pur-
chases. Col. McLean was quickly in com-
munication with the residents, greatly
to the discomfort of Collector Dunn, who
was edged around where Mr. Stewart
was heading in the smiles of four young
ladies who were dining on the river. There
is some doubt whether the collector will re-
late either of these incidents to his grand-
children.

A flag was hung to the breeze at Bel-
yea's in honor of the day, and a number
of the neighbors went down to meet the
party. When they learned that there
were half a dozen bank managers in the
lot, some of them retired to a safe dis-
tance.

MUST FACE TRIAL

**Eight Members of Tack Combine
Ordered to Toronto—Wm.
Bruckhof is One of Them.**

Toronto, Jan. 24.—(Special)—A formal
commitment for trial was made by Magis-
trate Denison today in the tack combine
case. Eight defendants will have to face
trial at the assizes, these being:
William McMaster and H. M. Blacklock,
of the Montreal Rolling Mills Company;
E. J. Fry, of Peck-Benny Company; F.
H. Whitson, of the Ontario Tack Com-
pany, Hamilton; W. Bruckhof, of the
Portland Rolling Mills, St. John (N. B.);
W. H. Woodhall, and James Hardy and
Thos. Jenkins, of Jenkins & Hardy, Tor-
onto.

The crown withdrew the case against T.
Edmond Peck, who is ill in hospital, and
J. R. Kinghorn, there being two other
Montreal rolling mills officers indicted.
The case will not come up until the next
assizes, which will open in March some
time.

FREDERICTON NEWS

Fredericton, Jan. 24.—Morrison's mill
started sawing again today, after being
down for some time. About seventy-five
men are employed at this mill which runs
on an average about ten and one-half
months of the year.

B. Harold Babbitt, of Gibson, has en-
tered the Royal Bank of Canada as junior
clerk.

In the recent examinations for class
three teachers' licenses, of the sixty-six
who wrote the papers in the English de-
partment, sixty-one passed, while in the
French department seventeen out of the
twenty-two who wrote papers passed.

The Glenora has acquired the Hamilton
Kitchen property on Queen street, oppo-
site the post office, and will occupy it
about April 1 next.

L. M. Trask, of Yarmouth (N. S.), an
agent for gasoline engines and other ma-
chinery, is in the county jail, having been
placed in custody at the instance of Harry
F. McLeod, solicitor for the Hamilton
Harvester Company of America, for an
account of \$302 and costs.

When the party had returned across the
ice to the Kitchen, a quadrille was ex-
ecuted on the ice with much precision and
effect by certain persons whose chief busi-
ness it is to make other people dance, but
whose names are withheld lest they should
be annoyed by requests to repeat the per-
formance of yesterday.

The Kitchen backed and turned, and
with all safety slowed, set out on the re-
turn voyage. Some interesting presenta-
tions were then made. Mr. Cutler, who
had made extensive purchases at Belyea's,
presented souvenirs to Commander Moore,
Mr. Russell, Mr. Shadbolt, Mr. Blair, Col.
McLean, Mr. Parrish, Mr. Miller and
some others. The nature of the gifts and
the accompanying remarks proved to be
highly amusing to the entire party, but
the recipients were charmed with the
delicate and considerate souvenirs of the
evening in which they were held by their
fellow-citizens. For example, Commander
Moore received a graceful eulogy and a
handsome comb, the purpose of the latter
being "to remove his little troubles."

It should be observed that on the voy-
age up the party were entertained at lun-
cheon, for Commander Moore insisted
that Arctic explorers, to be successful,
must be well fed. And they were both.

The return to Indiantown was a quick
run, and the party were in the street care
round city-ward shortly after 5 o'clock.
But it was wonderful. Those who had
the pleasure of being Mr. Moore's guests
will never forget this voyage of the 24th
of January. Except while at lunch they
were on deck all the time. After they
passed into Grand Bay, and all the way
up and down again the sun shone warm,
and heavy coats were not really needed.
It was like an early autumn day, the only
reminders of winter being the leafless
trees, a tiny patch of snow here and there
on the hills, or a fringe of thin ice some-
where along shore. It was like an autumn
evening on a river. Green Head B. A. Head,
Kennebecasis Island, Sand Point, Wood-
man's Point, Oak's Point, with the wreck
of the old David Weston still visible—all
the points and beaches familiar to the
fishermen welcomed these winter naviga-
tors. But looking in toward Millisville,
in ice boat could be seen darting up and
down at great speed, toward the eastern
shore, beyond Indian Island, where the
Kennebecasis ice is still firm. The sky
was almost as blue as that of summer,
and the vagrant wind was without the ordinary
chill of winter.

But when the party had returned the
sun had set, the wind came out of the
north and it was winter's breath that
greeted them in the streets of the city.
Before quitting the deck of the Kitchen
at Indiantown, the party expressed
to Mr. Moore their hearty thanks for the
pleasure of the afternoon. He had spared
no pains to afford them a good time, and
while they were anxiously hoping to go
"farther north" for some winters to come,
every sea-dog of them all stands ready at
any moment to rejoice the colors with Com-
mander Moore of the Lord Kitchen.

This is the latest winter excursion to go
up of which any record is preserved.
Just before the Kitchen reached Indi-
antown the half-dozen bankers agreed to
loan to Moore and Mr. Cutler
ten millions to establish winter tourist
hotels on the St. John river. No rate was
mentioned, as the deal was between
friends.

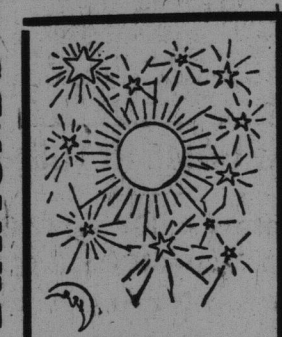
