IRREGULAR PRICE

CHANGES AT OPENING

New York, Oct. 5.—Wall street—Confusion of speculative sentiment was indicated by the irregular price changes at the opening of today's stock market. A few leaders registered substantial gains over yesterday's heavy close, while others were disposed to seek lower levels. United States Steel reflected after a firm start to its recent minimum of 109½, but immediately rallied a point, and Bethlehem Steel gained as much. Other equipments, oils, tobacco and active specialties were hesitant. Ohio Gas featured the utilities at a decline of two and a quarter.
