## LOCAL NEWS

Havelock Falls has been reported for driving a team without a license.

Diphtheria is reported prevalent at the Head of Millstream, Kings County.

The Sussex Record notes a scarcity of fresh-hatched eggs in that market.

An examination of the schooner J. Arthur Lord, which struck going through the falls recently, reveals no damage.

Queen Square Methodist Church will be in the hands of the carpenters and painters for some time and will receive considerable renovating and beautifying.

In an excellent programme of musical numbers last night the St. Mary's band delighted large numbers of people in King Square.

The game wardens are out for the scalps of young men who have been shooting along the lower Kennebecasis. There has been considerable illegal shooting this season, so it is claimed, and steps are being taken to put a stop to it.

The case of Robert Campbell, charged with illegally selling liquor on the west side, has been postponed until Friday next. One of the witnesses named Kinney, has been hard to find, the police say.

A report of selling liquor illegally has been made against Sarah Breeze. The case will be heard tomorrow in the police court.

The "Practice Boys" excursion took between 300 and 400 people to Fredericton this morning.

A party of Montreal capitalists interested in the Martin Head copper property went to Sussex this week and left for some operations. The mine is being steadily worked and considerable progress has been made in its development.

While in Main street this morning the king bolt of Alex. Clark's stolen broke and his load of wood was thrown over the street, and traffic stopped for about ten minutes. Another team came to the rescue.

J. Willard Smith today received a letter from Mrs. Smith who with their daughter is traveling with the Borden party on the continent. The letter is from Copenhagen and states that all are thoroughly enjoying themselves. They were about to start on the Norway trip.

The death of Henry Lawrence Cunningham, aged one year, son of Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Cunningham, occurred this morning. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the residence of his grandmother, Mrs. Catherine Mullin, 206 Metcalfe street.

There has been some difference of opinion as to when P. C. Durray is required to file plans for the proposed sugar refinery. An examination of the act with reference to the agreement with the company reveals that the plans are not required to be filed with the city before December 14. This is as the Telegraph announced.

The funeral of Llewellyn W. Smith, only child of Charles W. and Margaret Smith, took place this afternoon at 3.30 from the home of his parents, 116 Ludlow street; Rev. W. M. Robinson read the burial service. Interment was in Cedar Hill cemetery.

On Sunday next, the Presbyterian church at Mechanic Settlement will be reopened. The building has been thoroughly renovated and now presents a more attractive appearance. The services of Rev. J. F. Kelly, B. D., P. D., and Rev. Frank Baird, M. A., have been secured for the occasion.

George W. Hobert, druggist, of North End, while on a fishing trip to Harvey Station this week was set with an attack of paralysis. He was brought to the city last night, and taken to the General Public Hospital. His condition today is reported somewhat serious, and a consultation will be held tomorrow in the hospital.

Joe Francis, referee of boxing bouts in Cape Breton, was in Halifax on Wednesday and said that Jack Twin Sullivan is to return soon to meet Andy Morris, and agree to put him out in twelve rounds. Joe Walcott is also going to Sydney to meet Morris, and Francis says arrangements are being made for Bob Fitzsimmons to appear in exhibition contests.

In the police court this morning Chas. S. Goggin, proprietor of the Metropolitan Hotel, told of the medal employee by Henry Phillips, the young Englishman under arrest on a charge of stealing, to get \$10 from him. The defendant, he said, asked for a room, and presented a check dated May 27, Port William, (Ont.), signed by W. R. Brown, endorsed by H. Johnson, payable to the Port William Rowing Club and drawn on the Ray Streets & Co. When the cash was given Phillips he paid Goggin \$1 for his room, and with the balance disappeared. Phillips was remanded until Tuesday next.

The matter of the estate of Charles F. Stubbs, accountant, came up. He died intestate on August 18, 1907, leaving a wife, four sons and two daughters, one of the latter of whom has since died. The widow was appointed administratrix. Real estate is \$1,800; personal estate \$200. E. T. C. Knowles is proctor.

## DETECTIVE SAID TO HAVE CONFESSION FROM THE ITALIAN

**Not Allowed to Read it in Rossi Case in Police Court Today**

Andrew Rossi listened in the police court this morning to Detective Killen tell of the circumstances of his arrest, and statements which he made at that time. Rossi is not showing the effects of his confinement. As yet, it is thought that his old mother in Nondi, near Naples, in Italy's sunny clime, is unaware of her son's predicament, as he has not written her nor his two brothers or three sisters concerning it, rather allowing them to remain in ignorance.

The detective had in court this morning a statement, which it is said is a confession by Rossi, but on the objection of G. Earl Logan, counsel for the Italian, he did not read it but Deputy Chief Jenkins may do so, on Tuesday next when the case is resumed.

The detective told of going to Welford on the train and arresting the prisoner. He took the detective to a spot on the Marj road and the revolver said to have been used, was there recovered.

## ODDFELLOWS HOME AFTER CONVENTION

**New Grand Master, Dr. Smith, Pays Tribute to Predecessor's Work and is Hopeful for the Future**

Dr. A. D. Smith, the new grand master of the I. O. O. F., for the maritime provinces, together with nearly all the other delegates from St. John, in attendance at the maritime grand lodge meeting just held in Truro, N. S., returned home this morning on the I. C. R. They were very enthusiastic over the work of the order, and the success of the grand lodge meeting.

Dr. Smith, in speaking of the sessions just closed, said they had been of the most successful yet held. The retiring grand master, W. S. Hooper, of Fredericton, he said, was certainly to be congratulated on the great interest he had taken, and the good work he had accomplished during his term of office. He was deserving of all the good things that could be said about him.

As to the future, Grand Master Smith expressed much hope; the outlook was good, and already there were prospects of five or six new lodges in the maritime provinces.

In speaking of courtesies extended to the delegates in Truro, Dr. Smith particularly mentioned a visit they had made to the experimental farm, carried on by the Nova Scotia government. It was a revelation to all he said. There was an object lesson to some of our farmers. If they were to see it and learn, there would be no more slipshod methods about farms in this province.

He referred particularly to some dairy cattle, and mentioned one Holstein cow which averaged 15,000 pounds of milk a year, and a Jersey from whose milk three and a quarter pounds of butter were made daily. The success of the experimental farm had been marked. When it was taken over, it was hardly able to support twenty head of cattle and four horses, now they have eighty-five head of cattle and forty horses, and there is talk of increasing the stock.

## MR. QUINTON WAS IN COURT WITH SHERIFF

**Simonds Will Case Cause of Interesting Incident - C. F. Stubbs Estate**

The probate court this morning was the scene of an interesting event, when William J. Quinton, a witness who had been subpoenaed in the Simonds will case and had failed to obey, came into court accompanied by Sheriff Ritchie, on the strength of an attachment.

Some time ago, at the instance of Mr. Mullin, subpoena was left for Wm. Quinton at his residence. Mr. Quinton did not respond. A second subpoena was served personally and he failed to obey. Judge Armstrong then, at the request of Mr. Mullin, issued an attachment which was placed in the hands of Sheriff Ritchie.

When the court opened this morning both the sheriff and Mr. Quinton were present. The latter stated to the court that he was ill and not in a fit condition to testify, further that he had endeavored to get in touch with Mr. Mullin to explain why he did not obey the first order, but that when he telephoned Mr. Mullin the latter was out. He promised to attend to give evidence at a future date.

In view of what Mr. Quinton said, his honor adjourned the hearing until August 19. J. A. Sinclair appears for the legatees, Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C., for the executor, Hon. J. D. Hazen, K. C., and D. Mullin, K. C., for the children of the deceased.
