Chats with your GAS man

About Your Gas Bill 'Daily savings in little things makes big bank accounts,' recently stated a prominent banker.

And one little daily saving can be on your gas. Here are some helpful rules for getting more for the gas you use in your gas range. Tack these rules up beside your kitchen stove.

- 1. Plan your meals systematically, such as, when baking, plan an oven dinner. The gas ordinarily used to heat the oven is saved. 2. Light the burner just as a pan is placed over it. Turn gas off at once when pan is taken from flame. 3. Use a small burner on the gas range whenever possible, instead of a large one. 4. Don't use the oven to heat the kitchen or dry clothes. A small room heater is more efficient. 5. Boil all gas range burners once a month in a strong solution of soda or washing powder. Clean burners burn best. 6. Have all burners adjusted so that a blue flame only shows. 7. Have thermostatic controls, which automatically keep the heat at the proper temperature, installed on ovens, water heaters and house heaters.
