

SPECIAL TIME IS PLANNED FOR CATHOLIC YOUTH

Anniversary of St. Aloysius Observed Here Likely in November

ANNOUNCEMENTS MADE IN CATHEDRAL

Will Be Asked to Adopt Rule of Life—Silver Falls Work

Today is the Feast of St. Aloysius, patron of youth, and this year is the 200th anniversary of his canonization. The Catholic Church is making special observance of the centenary event, and announcements in this connection were made yesterday by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc.

His Lordship said that all the bishops had received from Pope Pius instructions in this regard leading to the participation of the Catholic youth all over the world in the centenary. There will be special exercises for them some time during the year, and in this diocese it is likely that November 13 will be selected as the special day. That is the Feast of St. Stanislaus, who, also, is a patron of youth. There will probably be a mission or a retreat for the young people in connection with the observance. This will include all between the ages of 12 and 24, and at the same time opportunity will be given the youth to make their jubilee visits in connection with the holy year.

FOR RULE OF LIFE

Bishop LeBlanc told of the life of St. Aloysius, his abandonment of worldly pleasures at the age of seven years and of his death at the age of 23. He also spoke of St. Stanislaus, whose life ended at the age of 18. He made reference to conditions of the present day, to the lack of obedience and of self-denial in the youth of these times and to the excessive giving over of themselves to lives of pleasure. In connection with the observance of the centenary of the canonization of St. Aloysius those between the ages of 12 and 24 would be asked to sign a promise to live up to a certain rule of life. These promises would be made up into a bound volume and would be placed on the tomb of St. Aloysius in the Church of St. Ignatius in Rome on the anniversary of his canonization, Dec. 31. It was not a vow they would take, but a promise on honor.

Work that must be done on the Boys' Industrial School, Silver Falls, has made necessary a request to the Catholic people of Saint John to give financial assistance. It was announced in the churches yesterday that included in the work to be done is attention to the heating apparatus. If there is given a sum to cover this and something more, there will be electric lights installed. The building is still lighted by the antiquated system of lamps. Bishop LeBlanc said that this was the first time a bound volume would be placed on the tomb of St. Aloysius in the Church of St. Ignatius in Rome on the anniversary of his canonization, Dec. 31. 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STABLE IS GUTTED IN MONCTON BLAZE

Hay and Harness Destroyed in Early Morning Outbreak; Horse Rescued

MONCTON, June 21.—An alarm from Box 82 called the fire departments out at 2:15 o'clock this morning for a fire which before it was subdued practically gutted a stable in the rear of 103 St. George street. The fire had evidently obtained a good start before being noticed, and when the firemen arrived on the scene the entire upper portion of the building was a mass of flames. A horse confined in one of the stalls was rescued with difficulty by police officers. The building is owned by Miss Minnie Seaman and was leased by F. C. Fillmore who conducts a grocery store on Botsford street. A quantity of hay, harness and other articles were destroyed while the roof and upper portion of the building was ruined. The building is understood to be covered by insurance, damage to which is in the vicinity of \$500.

WILL TRY AGAIN TO FIND ARCTIC LAND

Detroit Expedition Plans Return Flight Over Uncharted Waters in North

SEATTLE, Wash., June 21.—It was learned following the arrival from Fairbanks, Alaska, of five members of the Detroit Arctic expedition that another attempt will be made to find land in uncharted waters north of Alaska.

Parts to repair two airplanes of the expedition, it is said, are to be shipped to Alaska this summer. Included in the party to arrive here was Major G. Langier, unofficial United States army observer. Captain George H. Wilkins, leader of the expedition, is in Fairbanks.

FIRE RAZES CHURCH NEAR CAMPBELLTON

\$100,000 Loss as Edifice at St. Anne de Restigouche Destroyed

CAMPBELLTON, June 20.—The Roman Catholic church and monastery at St. Anne de Restigouche, P. Q., across the river from Campbellton, were totally destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon. The loss is estimated at nearly \$100,000. The fire broke out about 3 o'clock and the fire protection equipment of the Chateau Bay mill was put into action at once. The fire department here was also asked for help and a detachment of firemen with fire engine and other equipment were rushed to the ferry and taken to the scene of the blaze.

A high wind, similar to that of the day previous during the conflagration at Matapedia, swept the flames and had it not been for the effective work of the local brigade and the mill crew many nearby residences would have been destroyed. The fire also caught

\$5,000 Cash To U. N. B. From Bank of N. S.

FREDERICTON, June 20.—The trustees of the University of New Brunswick \$500,000 endowment fund initiated by Rt. Hon. Sir George E. Foster, of Ottawa, have received a cash donation of \$5,000 to the fund from the Bank of Nova Scotia.

This is the second cash contribution of \$5,000 which has been made to the fund by Canadian banking institutions, the other being made by the Royal Bank of Canada.

To date cash donations to the endowment fund amount to some \$36,000, while an equal amount has been pledged through subscriptions.
