Will Be Asked to Adopt Rule of Life-Silver Falls Work

Today is the Feast of St. Aloysius, patron of youth, and this year is the 200th anniversary of his canonization. The Catholic Church is making special observance of the centenary event, and announcements in this connection were

observance of the centenary event, and announcements in this connection were made yesterday by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc.

His Lordship said that all the bishops had received from Pope Pius instructions in this regard leading to the participation of the Catholic youth all over the world in the centenary. There will be special exercises for them some time during the year, and in this diocese it is likely that November 13 will be selected as the special day. That is the Feast of St. Stanislaus, who, also, is a patron of youth. laus, who, also, is a patron of youth.

There will probably be a mission or a retreat for the young people in connection with the observance. This will include all between the ages of 12 and

include all between the ages of 12 and 24, and at the same time opportunity will be given the youth to make their jubilee visits in connection with the holy year.

FOR RULE OF LIFE.

Bishop LeBlanc told of the life of St. Aloysius, his abandonment of worldly pleasures at the age of 23. He also spoke of St. Stanislaus, whose life ended at the age of 18. He made reference to conditions of the present day, to the lack of obedience and of self-denial in the youth of these times and to the excessive giving over of themselves to lives of pleasure. In connection with the observance of the centenary of the canonization of St. Aloysius those between the ages of 12 and 24 would be asked to sign a promise to live up to a certain rule of life. These promises would be made up into a bound volume and would be placed on the form of St. Aloysius in the Church of St. Ignatius in Rome on the anniversary of his consecration, Dec. 31. 
