WANTS LEAGUE ASSEMBLY TO MEET IN CANADA

Proposal in Commons by Hon. A. K. MacLean

Board to Investigate Audit System of Canada—Amendment to Shipping Act—Merchant Marine and Panama Canal Route.

Ottawa, June 16.—A proposal that the assembly of the League of Nations should be invited to hold its next meeting in Canada was made in the House of Commons last night by Hon. A. K. MacLean, Liberal, of Halifax.

CIVIL WAR NOT OVER IN IRELAND

Legal Decision of Master of Rolls in a Habeas Corpus Case.

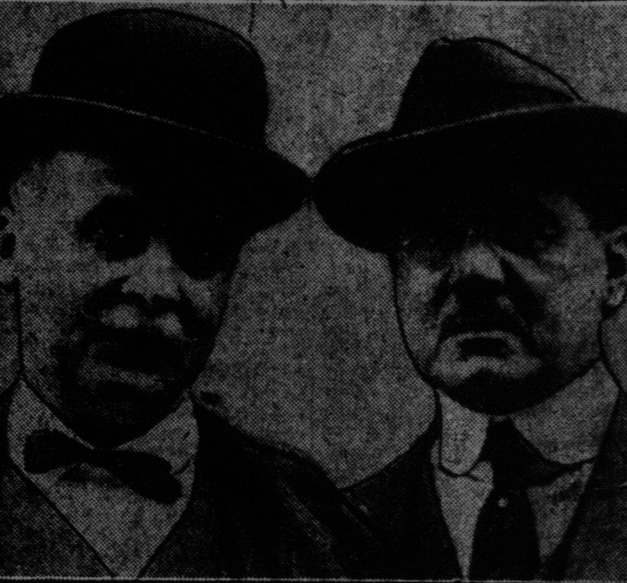
Dublin, June 16.—It was legally decided yesterday in the state of civil war in Ireland. The Master of the Rolls of the Chancery Division yesterday re-issued a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Nora Connelley, the wife of a Sinn Féin leader, who was executed in the Easter week rising, on the ground that a state of war still exists in the Free State.

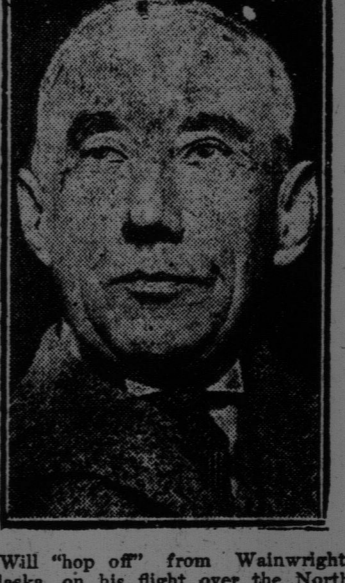
LONDON SOON AGAIN WORLD'S MONEY CENTRE

SHOWS DECREASE IN CRIME IN 1922

Compared With 1921 Homicide Record in the United States Shows a Slight Falling Off.

New York, June 16.—Showing a decrease from the previous year, the homicide record for 1922 in twenty-eight American cities, with a total population of 20,921,000, was 1,977, equivalent to 9.6 per 100,000 of population, according to a report published by the Spectator, an insurance publication. The improvement over 1921 is regarded by the paper as encouraging.

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HUNTS USE BOMB TO DERAIL TRAIN

Eight Passengers Injured—Director-General of Mines Gets Five Year Term and is Fined Millions.

Duesseldorf, June 16.—Eight passengers on a train bound for Paris were injured last night when two coaches were derailed by the explosion of a bomb on the tracks. The explosion occurred near Mayence, where the injured, some of whom were German civilians, were taken to hospital.

ENGLISH NOVELIST DEAD.

London, June 16.—Morris Hewlett, novelist, died of pneumonia yesterday at his home, Broadchalke, Salisbury. He was 62 years of age. Among his publications were "The Mask of Dead Florentines," "Songs and Meditations," "The Forest Lovers," "The Road in Fantasy," "Mrs. Lancelotti," "A Study of Profrailty," "The Village Wife's Lament" and a book of poems, "Flowers in the Grass."
