THE FIRST BREAK IN STEEL PRICES

No Prospect of An Early Revival of Demand, says Pittsburgh.

Pittsburgh, October 27.—The first important break among independent steel manufacturers to the Steel Corporation, or Industrial Board, price schedule occurred last week, when the Pittsburgh Crucible Steel Company began offering merchant steel bars in rounds, squares, and flats at 2.35 cents, the Steel Corporation price. Previously the lowest quotation among independents had been three cents, and some mills that had sold large tonnages at 2 cents had advanced their quotations to 3.25 cents, presumably with the idea of "protecting" the contracts on their books, rather than in expectation that sales could be made at the price.

There is no prospect that domestic demand for steel will revive in near future. There is no place where an increased demand could come in this period of general readjustment. By common consent men are waiting for the arrival of the new basis on which business is to proceed.

In some quarters it is thought there will be a slight revival in general business activity immediately after the election, but nothing of great importance is expected. As to railroad buying, the bald fact seems to be that while the Tech-Cummins act may be a model of railroad legislation, given fair and proper conditions in finance and industry generally, its real operation in stimulating railroad improvement must await such revision of the Federal taxing system as will justify investment in 6 per cent. railroad bonds by men of large incomes.

As to export demand, not a great deal can be expected. British steel prices, which had attained still fancier heights than our own, are declining and orders are being sought. Germany and Belgium have been getting into production. At best the entire demand of the non-producing countries is not very large, compared with American steel producing capacity.

HONOR TO NEGRO TROOPS

An impressive stone monument was unveiled on Monday at Monrovia, France, in honor of the 288th Central Postal Directory, a regiment of negro troops. The monument has been constructed under the direction of Gen. Quillet of the French Army, who commanded a division composed of the 271st, and 272nd American Infantry Regiments and the 33d French Infantry. Gen. Quillet and other high French officers were present at the ceremony, and representatives of the American Army: Col. R. J. West, Lieut. Col. T. Bentley Mott, military attaché to the American Embassy at Paris, and others. Cardinal Coeurdoux, Neveu of Rheims celebrated mass on the field.

\$400,000 A MONTH TO BE THE LEAGUE EXPENSE

Brussels, Oct. 28.—The sum of \$400,000 monthly has been requested by the League of Nations next year, according to the budget approved by the council of the league here yesterday. This budget will be presented to the league assembly at its coming sessions in Geneva.

London, Oct. 27.—The upper room at Jerusalem, where the Last Supper and the gathering of Christ's Disciples, has quite recently been presented by the Sultan of Turkey as a personal gift to the King of Italy. It is the most ancient sanctuary in Jerusalem. Around it were gathered many a story dating from very early days. Epiphanius, a Christian writer of the fourth century mentions a church built on this spot in Hadrian's reign about the year 120 A. D. The Empress Helena, mother of Constantine the Great, identified the spot and erected there a magnificent church to mark it for all time, and succeeding ages have spent much care and thought upon it.

PRESBYTERIAN WITNESS GOING TO TORONTO

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COST OF FRENCH OCCUPATION

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DECLARES MEXICO PACIFIED AT LAST

Joseph W. Rowe Finds Republic in Better Condition Than Since 1913.

The outlook in Mexico contains more favorable features today than it has at any previous time since the rise to power of Huerta in 1913, according to Joseph W. Rowe, representative in Mexico of the Irving National Bank, who has just returned to New York after a stay of five months in the southern republic. With peace restored, industrial and agricultural activities have received a fresh impetus, says Mr. Rowe. A steadily increasing output is being shown in both mining and oil operations, the grain crops are large, and it is now expected that for the first time in several years Mexico will have enough cotton not only for domestic consumption but a balance for export.

"Mexico's recovery since the downfall of the Carranza regime," said Mr. Rowe, "has been rapid. The new Provincial Government, headed by Adolfo de la Huerta and dominated by his energy and common sense, has accomplished in four months what Carranza failed to do in six years; it has pacified the country. All the important rebel leaders who opposed the new Government or have been eliminated as enemies of political life. Travel is safe in virtually every part of the country. If no longer necessary for troops to carry military guards, and we no longer hear of them being attacked or blown up."

"One hesitates to prophesy, but two outstanding facts give ground for optimism. One is that the people, without whom there would be no armies in Mexico, is tired of fighting. Second the military policy of the Government toward opposition—undoubtedly will be continued when Obregon becomes president—is so effective and practical that the likelihood of any real movement of importance arising is greatly diminished."

"There are ample manifestations of growing public confidence in the Government. From the beginning of his administration de la Huerta has paid all Government employees in full. United Carranza these men received only three-fourths of their pay. This step has made many friends for the Government. The people now show no hesitation in depositing money with banks, and several new banking institutions recently have been opened. The Carranza had soldiers near the entrance to the church grounds saluted. Then they climbed into the lorries which with the armoured cars, fell in behind the carriages of the mourners."

The funeral of Murphy had a remarkable finale—the firing of a salute over the grave by Irish volunteers. Six men comprised the squad and three volleys were fired. The military had departed. The soldiers did not enter the cemetery. They drove off before the burial service had concluded. They made no attempt to interfere with the procession on the way to the cemetery."

LORNE HELMER FOUND GUILTY OF MANSLAUGHTER

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Since Oct. 27.—Guilty of manslaughter, with a strong recommendation to mercy, was the verdict of the jury at the assizes here this evening in the case of Lorne Helmer, charged with the murder of James A. Leary, an aged farmer of Walsingham township, Ont., on July 13 last. Mr. Justice Kelly, who presided at the trial, will deliver sentence tomorrow.

In summing up the evidence for the jury the judge referred to the fact that the chief witness for the crown was the prisoner's brother, who had seen the tragedy. His Lordship instructed the jury that a charge of murder could be reduced to one of manslaughter when undue provocation and in the heat of passion, a fatal blow was struck.

TWO THOUSAND PEOPLE ATTEND IRISH FUNERAL

Cork, Oct. 27.—The funeral of Joseph Murphy, who died while on a hunger strike in Cork Jail, was held today. Notwithstanding an order limiting the number of persons who might participate in the funeral procession to 100 and the presence of two armed cars and six lorries with troops, 2,000 persons followed the body of Murphy to the cemetery this afternoon. The display of armed forces was even greater than at the funeral of Michael Fitzgerald, the old hunger striker who died in Cork Jail, but this created none of the tension that prevailed at Fitzgerald's burial.

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NEW PRICE FOR THE GOVERNMENT LIME

Under a new arrangement between Hon. J. P. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture, and Smith & Merriweather, who are crushing limestone under an arrangement with the department of agriculture at Brookville, crushed lime for fertilizer will be sold at the Brookville siding for \$8 a ton f.o.b. in car load lots, according to a despatch from Fredericton. The purchaser will pay freight charges to destination. The former price was \$5 a ton delivered at the railway station indicated by the purchaser. The increase in freight rates has made it impossible to continue the old arrangement. The lime contract has therefore been amended to meet the increased cost in freight rates, as provided by its terms when drawn up.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale will protest to the chairman of the railway commission against the ruling of the railways that crushed lime intended for rectification of soils must be classified to come under the increased freight rates. The commission ruled originally that the increase would not apply to such crushed stone. The limit which is being turned out at Brookville by analysis of Professor Shutt, Dominion analyst of Ottawa, contains ninety-three per cent pure lime.

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
