## KRUPP DIRECTOR KEPT A DIARY

It Was Brought Across Swiss  
Frontier and Made Public

Germany Willed the War, and  
Could Easily Have Prevented it  
Had She Chosen to do So

London, May 22.—The Daily News has received from Bern, Switzerland, a diary compiled by Dr. Muehlen, one of the directors of Krupp's during the first three months of the war. After laying undisturbed in Germany for three years the diary recently has been brought across the frontier and will be published next week. The text remains unchanged, but Dr. Muehlen is withholding from publication sections of his diary dealing with the activities of Krupp's firm. The names of personalities mentioned in the diary are also withheld, but they all, as can easily be understood, figured and still figure among the greatest in Germany.

The diary was compiled by one who was head of the political department at Krupp's, and it will help historians not only to fix the responsibility for the war, in so far as that has not been settled by Prince Lichnowsky, but to know, also, the sentiments which prevailed in high German circles at its outbreak. I have been permitted to read the manuscript, and I send in summarized form a few entries. The first gives at somewhat greater length the text of Dr. Muehlen's well-known charges against the German government. Others are:

Aug. 16.—News from Berlin.—A man who has just conferred with the naval and foreign office secretaries and military chief tells us all are in high spirits. Everything goes like clockwork, and in a few days the German army will be all over France. He says the German fleet has looked for the British fleet in vain.

Win By Any Means.

Aug. 27.—Under the direction of the foreign office great and unscrupulous efforts are being made to capture governments, deputies, writers, journalists and all neutrals. I will not speak here of the methods, but I doubt their success.

Aug. 28.—I spoke yesterday about my doubts with a large circle of prominent men, but nobody shared my views. "We must win the war by any means," is their refrain.

Sept. 6.—I had another conversation with the great industrial magnates about the division of the spoils. An unabashed robber policy prevails. One speaker declared that his industrial colleagues, Thyssen, Stinnes and Kirdorf, have thrown all their influence upon the side of a policy of force.

Sept. 20.—Laconic, but informing messages from the front, from a man who has come from headquarters where the emperor received him, says the outlook is unsatisfactory. I need not go into the details, but it is clear the German higher command did not reckon on a serious opposition from the French near Paris and had not seen an enemy army which hurried our army back.

The Coming Man.

Oct. 4.—An important man who has returned from general headquarters says the emperor is seen there only for a short time daily. Von Moltke is somewhat apathetic. The real motive force and the coming man is von Falkenhayn, who is supported by all.

Oct. 5.—I have had a talk with one of our best known financiers. He says he "only" wants Longwy and Brye from France because of their own wealth and the greater part of Belgium, including Brussels and Ostend. The present imperial chancellor and foreign secretary seem to him unfitted for obtaining such terms.

Nov. 1.—It is worth mentioning that I met today a great German industrial chief, who does not share the prevailing hatred and blindness.

The final entry, which is not dated, reads: "Today I met one of our most representative Germans who told me, to my amazement, that we had killed the war and could easily have prevented it." In a brief and moving preface to the diary, Dr. Muehlen urges the German people to seek the whole truth.

Although possessing the honor of cultivating the first field of wheat, the maritime provinces have never attained prominence as a producer of this particular cereal. Oats have been their specialty for the last three years has been 584,338 bushels.

If every one of them complies with this request the average acreage of wheat three years would be nearly doubled. And while even this may appear to be a small gain, it is a gain when compared with the enormous acreage common to the western provinces, yet when we consider that every four and a third bushels of wheat produced creates the material for making an additional barrel of flour, every acre counts.

## ENGLISH SPEAKING UNITY AFTER WAR

"I recognize that it is because of the cause which I represent that you have conferred this honor on me," said the Earl of Reading in thanking Toronto University last week for the honor which had been conferred upon him.

"I recognize that you intend to endorse to the fullest capacity the cause for which the whole British Empire is now engaged."

"I regard it as especially appropriate that we should have present representatives of not only Great Britain but also the United States. It signifies the close linked association of these two great empires, who now, for the first time in their history, are standing together fighting for the one great cause, forgetting all old differences, recognizing only that we are champions of right, who will stand together to the last—until the right is fully vindicated."

"We are here today in the face of the greatest realities that ever have been the call to sacrifice and service. It is an equal call to the women, and when we have responded to it with equal devotion and patriotism, I have no message to give you, he said, in conclusion."

"We stand together without need of message. The honor roll just read is evidence of that. The thousands of men who have left these halls needed no message, we need no message other than that."

"This is not the place to speak of what Canada has done, but I would not be representing my king and our people if I did not say that we all know that Canada is heart and soul in the war."

"And after the war—when the war is ended, and when peace has come, the only peace we will ever contemplate, when victory is established, and when we set to work on reconstruction, I see on the horizon, not only the countries of Britain, and the whole of the British Empire, but all the English-speaking nations, with the same ideals, the same purposes. We will be able to achieve benefits which battle description, but will benefit the world and the whole human race."

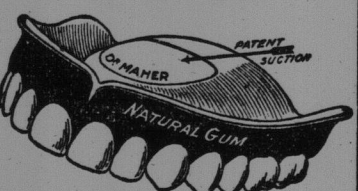
