SAY DRUNKENNESS IN BOSTON HAS INCREASED

Liquor Dealers Urge as Remedy, Local Option—They and Antisaloan League Given Hearing

(Boston Globe). Asserting that since the "bar and bottle" bill had gone into operation the arrests for drunkenness in the state had increased to "record-breaking" figures, a large number of men engaged in the wholesale and retail distribution of liquor urged before the committee on local affairs at the State House this morning the passage of a bill which makes optional with towns and cities whether the "bar and bottle" provision shall apply to the dealers in their community.

JAPANESE FACTORY GIRLS.

In Japan legislation for the protection of the workers has not kept pace with industrial expansion, says the London Daily Telegraph. In factories employing girls the conditions are said to be such as to call for drastic remedy.
