GOVERNMENT HEARS LOCAL DELEGATES

At the meeting of the provincial government held yesterday, C. H. Reason, local manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and E. A. McCurdy, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Newcastle, with H. A. Powell, K.C., as counsel, waited on the government to discuss the decision that a bonus will be required with each application for renewal of leases for timber lands and that application must be made before August 1 for the leases which expire five years hence.

Representatives of the Natural History Society asked for a grant to aid in the entertainment of the Geological Congress which visits St. John in July. Residents of Long Island, in the Kennebecasis, asked government assistance in securing communication with the main land.

J. B. Jones, liquor license inspector of St. John, was heard in reference to various matters pertaining to the better enforcement of the Liquor License Act.

The members of the Farm Settlement Board gave an account of their work and the usefulness of the work in future.

The Bathurst Electric Lighting Co. applied for the right to expropriate certain properties needed in connection with their business, and their application was granted.

The Bangor Maroons are fast getting into shape, and Manager Masoon predicts that when the team plays the home games this week the local fans will sit up and take notice. New pitchers are strengthening the team in great shape. Wallace, who played such a good game Saturday, is doing great work in practice, and McLean, a south-paw, who only recently joined the Maroons, is working out well.

Magoon has signed a new backstop, G. M. Brooks, of the Massachusetts Agricultural college team, who has just finished his season. Brooks has been working out under the coaching of Billy Pittman, who is well known here, and comes on Fitzmaurice's recommendation. It is expected that he will be here in time for the game Wednesday, when the Maroons of St. John arrive here.

"Red" Wilder, released from the St. Croix team, is showing up well in practice with the Bangor lads. He is a fast infielder, and at second base is adding a little "pop" that has been badly needed. He knows the game and plays it all the time.

In addition to Bobby Keeler, the new umpire, the league has hired "Hi Hi" Labele, who has been a substitute umpire in the New England league for the last three years and he will report for duty this week.

A meeting of the board of directors of the Bangor Baseball association was held Monday evening, at which it was decided that more funds should be raised to help out the finances, which have met with severe strain on account of the setbacks due to cold waves, rainy days and postponed games. The large expense of getting new players has also cut into the funds on hand. Compensatively few people have contributed as yet and those in small amounts, although many have signified their willingness to help back the team.

"A team that plays ball as the Maroons did on Saturday is a good advertisement for the city, and the merchants ought to be willing to help the good work along," said one of the directors Tuesday. "The prospects for good weather, a much increased attendance and a winning team are all good now, and but little outside help will be needed."
