One-half grapefruit, 1 thin crisp piece broiled bacon, 1 cup vegetable soup, 2 tablespoons whole wheat croutons, 1 head lettuce, 1 cup clear tomato soup, 1 cup chicken salad, 3 large green olives, 4 button radishes, 1 cup hot chopped spinach with lemon juice, 2 tablespoons strawberry fluff, 1 ladyfinger or 1 small piece sponge cake, 1 pint skimmed milk, 2 crisp pieces whole wheat toast.

Total calories, 1173. Protein, 84; fat, 366; carbohydrate, 466. Iron, .020 gram.

Strawberry Fluff

One cup fresh strawberries cut in quarters, 1 cup powdered sugar, 1 egg white. Put all the ingredients in a bowl. Beat with a duster until stiff. It will take about 20 minutes and the "beater" should be very strong.

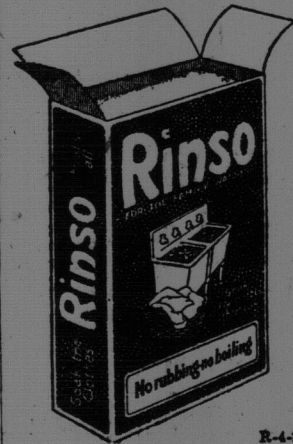

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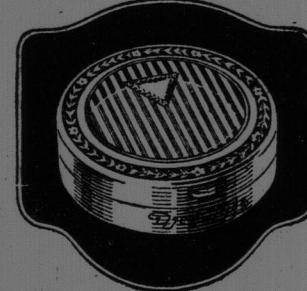
