Invents Unique Timing Machine



Coach Tom Jones of the University of Wisconsin is the inventor of a most ingenious device to aid runners in determining their pace while training on the track. The machine, as shown in the picture, has much the appearance of a radio set. When a runner wishes to run a certain distance in a certain time, he adjusts the machine to ring a gong at an interval of time equal to what he should cover each lap in. Thus, if he runs correctly, he will pass the machine on each lap just as the gong rings, signifying that he has set the correct pace. The machine has been successfully used since its introduction in the University of Wisconsin gymnasium.
