

GOVERNMENT IS TO MEET TONIGHT

May Be Some Announcements at Fredericton—Victoria Hospital, Housing and Municipal Home.

(Special to Times) Fredericton, N. B., June 8.—Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Hon. J. P. Byrne and Hon. P. J. Veniot have arrived here for a meeting of the provincial government tonight. Several important announcements are expected. Hon. Mr. Veniot has covered considerable mileage of highway since the last meeting.
